NEWS FROM THE PASTOR

Becoming an Easter People

*So they went out and fled from the tomb,
for terror and amazement had seized them;
and they said nothing to anyone,
for they were afraid.*

Mark 16:8

Mark's gospel ends abruptly, in a mysterious, almost cryptic manner. The women flee the empty tomb in terror. Nothing is said.

Yet, something *must* have been said. After all, here we are, two thousand years later. There is a church. And, it is everywhere. Christianity has a global reach.

So what happened to transform a frightened band of disciples into a global movement? How did they become an Easter people—people unafraid to be a blessing to the whole world?

What's fascinating about Mark's ending is that it puts us, the hearers of the gospel, squarely in the story. After all, *we* are here.

This means that someone first blessed us with the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Maybe that someone was a parent. Maybe that someone was a Sunday School teacher. Maybe it was a friend who invited you to a high school youth group even or a college pal who invited you to a fellowship group.

We wouldn't be here if someone hadn't blessed us with the good news and invited us to be a part of the Jesus movement. We wouldn't be here if it wasn't for Easter people.

During the weeks and months ahead you will be hearing more about our Metropolitan Washington D.C. Synod's New Connections Campaign. One of the aims of the campaign is to provide congregations with the tools and training to live into their calling to be an Easter people. One such tool is the BLESS cards that we will be distributing later this month. (More about the BLESS cards elsewhere in the Quest.) These BLESS cards are a tool for us to use as we live into our calling to be Easter people, people who have been blessed to be a blessing.

As we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, I encourage you to remember and thank God for the Easter people in your life who have blessed you with the good news of God's love for the world. I would also challenge us as individuals and as a community to live into our calling to be Easter people, people who bring the good news of God's love to a world sorely in need of healing and hope.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

This April (April 6 to be exact) marks our 10th anniversary with the Evangelical Lutheran Worship hymnal. It seems like it has been much longer and I'm happy to say that HCLC seems at home with this new worship book. Over the past 10 years we have learned four new liturgical settings while still going back to the familiar ones frequently. Many new hymns have been used in worship, some with new texts to old tunes, and some with both new text and tune.

I took time this week to go back and look at the bulletin for our dedication service for these new hymnals. The excitement and energy level of this service made it one of my favorite services and a definite fond memory! The director of music at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Bethesda, MD received a copy of our service and enjoyed it so much that he asked if they could model their service after ours! I thought I'd share the text from the actual dedication of the new hymnals. This text reminds us, through scripture, the many reasons why we sing.

The people of God have sung songs from the beginning of time. We sing in times of ceremony: **"David and all the house of Israel were dancing before the Lord with all their might, with songs and lyres and harps and tambourines and castanets and cymbals."** (*2 Samuel 6:5*)

We sing because our God is so great and so good: **"Praise the Lord with the lyre; make melody to him with the harp of ten strings. Sing to him a new song; play skillfully on the strings, with loud shouts."** (*Psalms 33:2-3*)

We sing in times of celebration: **"Sing aloud to God our strength; shout for joy to the God of Jacob. Raise a song,**

sound the tambourine, the sweet lyre with the harp. Blow the trumpet at the new moon, at the full moon, on our festal day." (Psalm 81:1-3)

We sing because it pleases God: **"Praise the Lord! Sing to the Lord a new song, his praise in the assembly of the faithful. . . For the Lord takes pleasure in his people." (Psalm 149:1,4a)**

We sing as an expression of our joy and thanksgiving: **"It is good to give thanks to the Lord, to sing praises to your name, O Most High; to declare your steadfast love in the morning, and your faithfulness by night, to the music of the lute and the harp, to the melody of the lyre. For you, O Lord, have made me glad by your work; at the works of your hands I sing for joy." (Psalm 92:1-4)**

We sing in times of uncertainty and distress: **"I tell you, I will never again drink of this fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom. When they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives." (Matthew 26:29-30)**

And we sing because it is part of our new life in Christ: **"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God." (Colossians 3:16)**

We present these hymnals to the glory of God and for service in the life of this congregation. We dedicate them to the glory of God and in honor and loving memory of family, friends, and others for whom we now offer thanks.

Let us pray. Eternal and loving God, We thank you for music and the gift of song through which we offer our praise and thanksgiving, our confessions and petitions, and our sorrows and laments. We give

thanks to you for all those who have contributed to this hymnal: the authors, composers, arrangers, and translators who give us the words and music to express the thoughts and emotions that may otherwise have remained silent. We give thanks for the lives and the witness of those in whose honor and memory these hymnals have been given. We pray that these hymnals may be used in worship, in education, in outreach, in evangelism, in nurture, in fellowship, and in faithfulness. We consecrate them, and our lives, to your service, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

During the month of April we will begin celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ and the bringing of a new life to our Christian lives. I am very happy that our worship books have been able to bring vibrant energy to our services and pray that they will continue to be a useful tool for lifting up our Lord’s name in musical praise!

HCLC SURVEY ON CONGREGATIONAL ATTITUDES TO LGBTQ+

By the time you receive this issue of the Quest, you will have received a letter from Pastor Kleiber informing you of an on-line survey on LGBTQ+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, questioning) issues. You should also have received a link via e-mail to this survey.

The information obtained from the survey will serve two purposes:

1. It will assist the Call Committee to answer questions from pastoral candidates who wish to know Holy Cross's position vis-à-vis the 2009 Statement on Human Sexuality, same gender marriage, and welcoming stance towards LGBTQ+.
2. It will help the council assess whether or not Holy Cross might take steps towards becoming a RIC (Reconciled in Christ) congregation.

Please respond faithfully and prayerfully to the questions. The last day for completing the survey will be Tuesday, April 17, 2018. If you do not have access to the Internet to take the survey, we will have people available to help you complete the survey at church on Sunday, April 8th and Sunday, April 15th.

If you wish to familiarize yourself with the contents of the ELCA's Social Statement on Human Sexuality before completing the survey, Pastor Kleiber will be holding adult classes Sunday, April 8th and Sunday, April 15th, on that material. Copies are also available in the entryway to the church.

CHAPLAIN (MAJ) SCOTT HAGEN UNITED STATES ARMY CHAPLAIN CORPS



Chaplain (MAJ) Scott Hagen was born and raised in St. Paul, MN. He graduated from Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, MN in 1984 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in chemistry. After college Chaplain Hagen worked in new drug discovery and clinical research in the

pharmaceutical industry. He attended Luther Seminary in St. Paul, earning the Master of Divinity Degree (M.Div.) in 1999.

He was ordained a Pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in 1999 and served Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Faribault, MN from 1999-2006. He was commissioned as a 1LT in the Chaplain Corps in 2002. Since 2002 Chaplain Hagen has served in the 103rd Chaplain Detachment (2002-2003), the 367th Engineer Battalion (2003-2006), deploying in support of Operation Enduring Freedom V to Afghanistan; and the Casualty and Memorial Affairs Operations Center, HRC-Alexandria (2006).

In September 2006 Chaplain Hagen was selected for the Active Guard Reserve (AGR) program. He currently serves, as of July 2017, as OCAR/USACHCS Integrator and Assistant Personnel Manager for the Office of the Chief of Chaplains – Reserve Component Integrator Directorate.

Chaplain Hagen was married 17 August 1985 to the former Laurie Berge of Poughkeepsie, NY. They have four sons, Jonathan - 29, Matthew - 27, Erik - 25 and Joshua - 21.





SYNOD AND CHURCH-WIDE NEWS



Our Metropolitan Washington D.C. Synod has invited Holy Cross to be part of something bigger than ourselves. Right now, our synod is conducting a New Connections Campaign, challenging individuals and congregations to be a part of the Jesus movement. New Connections has four priorities:

1. To grow Existing Congregations
2. Develop Church Leadership
3. Plant New Ministries
4. Tithe to the ELCA

The goal is to grow membership in our synod by 10%, or about 3000 people. To further that goal, the synod has embarked on a \$2.25 million dollar fundraising campaign. Over half of that amount, \$1.3 million has already been received or pledged.

TINY CHURCH, BIG GOALS

With approximately 350 baptized members, two congregations, two new outreach ministry sites, multiple ministries and big dreams, “the Lutheran Church in Cambodia (LCC) is a young church that is on the verge of doubling its mission outreach with great zeal,” said Y. Franklin Ishida, ELCA global mission director for Asia and the Pacific.

Founded in 2010, the LCC is a product of the Lutheran Church in Singapore’s mission work—a denomination founded in partnership with the Lutheran Church in America, an ELCA predecessor. Although outside funding from the ELCA and the church in Singapore is still important for the young church, Daniel Orn, a founding pastor, said the LCC aims to be self-sufficient by 2035.

In this mostly Buddhist country, however, growing the church through direct evangelism isn’t effective, Orn said. Instead, the church attracts people to the faith through the caring way its members live and through its holistic, innovative ministries. One such example is the LCC’s hostel project and congregation in Phnom Penh.

The hostel met a critical need for the LCC’s first congregation in Kruos Village, which had six university students looking for affordable housing. By 2012 the hostel ministry had grown so much that the LCC was able to purchase three, three-story units.

Now the hostel has a congregation of 100 members aged 19 through 30 that represents 10 of Cambodia’s 25 provinces. Most are university students like Sareoun Chum, a young adult leader and hostel volunteer.

Chum appreciates that his church not only “works with the soul” but also focuses on serving the poor.

Aware of its roots as a mission start, the vibrant church is looking ahead to a time when it will engage in global mission work too. Orn said the LCC hopes “to send missionaries to serve to restore Christians in Europe in the next 20 to 30 years.”

Your Mission Support dollars are used by the ELCA churchwide organization to fund global ministry work, including the support of the Lutheran Church in Cambodia.
