NEWS FROM THE PASTOR

NEW CONNECTIONS

*So those who welcomed his message were baptized,
and that day about three thousand persons were added.*

Acts 2:41

On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples. Empowered by the Spirit Peter and his companions proclaimed the good news of Jesus Christ with grace and conviction. They made new connections to the community around them and that day **three thousand persons** became part of the body of Christ!

Our Metropolitan Washington D.C. Synod has embarked on a New Connections campaign to grow our synod by **three thousand persons!** This goal includes plans to plant three new ministries. In order to further that goal, the synod has embarked on \$2.25 million campaign. Funds designated for this campaign will support the training and coaching of congregational leaders as they pursue to goal of growing the body of Christ, as well as support for new and innovative church initiatives.

In March, the Holy Cross Council committed to being a part of the New Connections Campaign. Our goal is to forge 48 new connections for Holy Cross and to raise \$14,000 over the course of three years, 2018 to 2021, for the New Connections campaign. Mike Faulkner, our New Connections Chair for Stewardship will be sharing more about this when we embark on our fall stewardship campaign.

The **BLESS** cards that you received are part of the New Connections campaign. You are encouraged to incorporate being a **BLESSing** in all that you do, building new connections to folks in Herndon, Reston and beyond. New Connections is a way to

support our own congregation goal, identified through the Church Assessment Tool (CAT) ***of developing a comprehensive strategy to reach new people and incorporate them into the life of the church.***

This month Roy Geiger, our New Connections Chair for Engagement (Evangelism), is asking for volunteers to be a Holy Cross presence at the Herndon Festival. This is an opportunity for Holy Cross folks to be a **BLESSing** to the community:

Bridge with Boldness
Listen with Openness
Eat with Friendliness
Serve with Compassion
Share with Conviction

As we conclude our **BLESS** sermon series on Pentecost Sunday I would encourage us as individuals and as a community to live into our calling to be Easter people, people who bring the good news of God's love to a world sorely in need of healing and hope. Let us go out into the world just as the early disciples did and build New Connections!

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

*Why did we used to sing “Amen” at the end of hymns
and no longer do?*

The word “Amen” is used in literature as an assertive word, meaning “indeed.” In liturgy it is *our* answer that one makes to a phrase or statement that someone else has just said, meaning, “may it be so” or, “yes, I want to be a part of that.” Therefore, it is rightly used at the end of a prayer that the minister or assisting minister says for the congregation. “Amen” is also used frequently in evangelical traditions to express support of or agreement with certain ideas in a sermon. Strictly, there is no need for it after a prayer that is said by the entire congregation. It just adds an extra level of dedication to the prayer. As if to say, “Yes, I really meant the prayer I just said.”

Its use at the end of hymns began in a time when hymns were sung by monastic choirs and priests. At the end of the hymn the congregation would sing an “Amen.” They get to listen to the beautiful hymn and then say to God, “Yes, we agree with the praises just sung in Your name.” The practice became even more widespread in the fourth century when there was a rise of anti-Trinitarian debate. Hymn writers began adding Trinitarian stanzas to the end of all their hymns and made sure there was an “Amen” for the congregation to sing, forcing everyone to assert their belief in the Trinity on a regular basis.

Now that hymns are sung by the entire congregation there is really no need to have an “Amen” at the end of every hymn. The inclusion of them makes the ending of all hymns the same and boring. Every time an Amen was sung at the end of a hymn it had the same note structure, it was always accompanied by the Plagal Cadence (a IV chord to a I chord). It was used so consistently that the Plagal Cadence quickly became known as the Amen Cadence.

HCLC congregational Responses to LGBTQ+ Survey

Dear Holy Cross members,

Thank you for participating in the HCLC survey on attitudes toward Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transsexual, and Questioning (LGBTQ+) people! **A total of 104 of you responded to the survey** which had been distributed to 160 Holy Cross member e-mail addresses. This is a response rate of 65%--which is very good! (The average response rate for an internal survey such as this is between 30 to 40%.)

These results will provide our call committee with actual data regarding congregational attitudes to LGBTQ+ matters. Now, when candidates ask about same gender marriage or about congregational openness to LGBTQ+ people, the call committee will be able to present an honest picture of where people in the congregation stand.

The survey will also provide information to the congregational council regarding the congregation's openness or opposition to same-gender marriage.

The questions and your answers follow on the next few pages. Thank you again for taking the time to respond faithfully and prayerfully. Please do not hesitate to call me or any of the council leadership if you have questions about how this information will be used.

GUEST PREACHING MINISTER ON TRINITY SUNDAY



Holy Cross is honored to welcome the Rev. Dr. Gordon Lathrop as our guest preaching and presiding minister on Trinity Sunday – May 27!

Gordon W. Lathrop is a pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and a retired

professor of liturgy who has taught at two different seminaries of the ELCA, at Yale Divinity School and at the Virginia Theological Seminary. Prior to that teaching he served parishes in Wisconsin and in Washington State. He has a doctorate in New Testament studies from the Radboud University in Nijmegen, the Netherlands (1969), and honorary doctorates in theology from the University of Helsinki (2011) and from the University of Iceland (2017). He is the author of several books, including *Holy Things: A Liturgical Theology* (Fortress 1993), *The Pastor: A Spirituality* (Fortress 2006), *The Four Gospels on Sunday: The New Testament and the Reform of Christian Worship* (Fortress 2012), and *Saving Images: The Presence of the Bible in Christian Liturgy* (Fortress 2017).

In 1985 he was the President of the North American Academy of Liturgy. In the 1990s, he was a participant in the international Faith and Order meetings on Worship and Christian Unity. From 2011 until 2013 he was President of Societas Liturgica, the international society of scholars in liturgy. He and his wife share four children and five grandchildren. He lives now in Arlington and is a member of Resurrection Lutheran Church.

The all-volunteer staff at LINK believe in the power of selfless service and the importance of providing people in crisis with unconditional love. This love includes commitment, compassion, and the courage to serve the sick, abused, hurt, unloved, and powerless.

"I received your delivery from LINK today several hours ago. I just was able to get up and put everything away I am so shocked that the quantity and quality of food that you brought me. My house has not had this much food in a year! I am so pleased - the chicken

salad, everything - it's just so exciting! I wanted to thank you and I'm sending a \$15 donation because that's all I have right now but I am so very, very grateful and I just wanted you all to know. Thank you."

Email Received –

"We very much appreciate the help from LINK for the past several years. Your organization have been a blessing. We are so great full for the help. We have 2 autistic sons. This year a 19 yr old and a 14 year old. The older son is still waiting for a group home placement.

We would love to thank the LINK Holiday Project for helping us during the Holidays and for helping us provide Christmas for our kids for the past several years. We have a huge nasty debt that keeps growing due to the medical bills not covered by insurance or Medicaid. Having a son in mental health hospitals that he needs and our insurance does not cover has left us in deeper debt that we make in one year with 3 jobs.

Thank you for the services that your organization does to help families like ours in need. You are a blessing. We cannot thank you and your organization enough."

I am not sure I can add to those notes except, to thank you all for what you do that enables our church to contribute to the good work that LINK has been doing for so many years.

ANOTHER SUCCESS

Thank you, to all who contributed so generously to our collection for the Greater DC Diaper Bank and Shelter House. We delivered the donations to the organizations—roughly \$325.00 worth of diapers and wipes and \$525.00 in household goods and cleaning supplies. They were so very grateful for the generosity of Holy Cross members.

The manager of the diaper warehouse told us a story about one of the people they serve. A pre-school teacher had a student, Timothy, who came to class very sporadically for a long time; then he started coming on a daily basis. The teacher asked his mom what had changed and she answered that since she was receiving diapers on a regular basis she didn't have to choose between buying him diapers and having bus fare to bring him to school. Because you cared and you shared, a huge difference was made in that child's life. I hope you will continue to support these two organizations in any way you can!

Our Inova Blood Drive was also very successful. We had 28 donors including not only Holy Cross members, but folks from the community. We plan to make this a regular event and will hold another drive in six months.



SYNOD AND CHURCH-WIDE NEWS



At 109 years old, St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran Church in Baltimore had deep roots in the community but was in danger of closing. The congregation's unstable situation was akin to many others in southeast Baltimore in 2009, the year Mark Parker, their current pastor, arrived.

Parker said it was their synod's director for evangelical mission that suggested rapidly transforming the congregation by focusing on the surrounding community. This changed St. Paul into what is now known as Breath of God Lutheran Church.

"A congregation in decline in terms of numbers and energy and people has a really hard time reversing that because you need resources in order to do different things," Parker said. "Each year [the new start funds] gave us room to grow without a sense of scarcity or anxiety it could all fall apart next month because we couldn't pay the bills."

Breath of God is in an area that is rich in diversity. In order to grow, the congregation began to shift its focus outward to its surrounding neighborhood.

"We do a lot more community outreach than we did in the last 25 years," said longtime member Joe Burk. "The building is used every day of the week."

The new direction invigorated current members and began attracting new ones. "I felt inspired in a way where I haven't felt before from a church," said member Jennifer Pruitt.

The change in focus would not have been possible were it not for the funds Breath of God received through Mission Support, according to Parker. At the same time, they contribute between 10 and 12 percent of their annual offerings to Mission Support. "It's interesting because we give Mission Support and then we're getting it back," he said. "That's how the church works; we sustain each other."

Your Mission Support dollars are used by the ELCA church-wide organization to support directors for evangelical mission and new congregations like Breath of God.
