



In the uneven places in our lives, in the dry and crooked paths we all too often find ourselves, come, Lord Jesus.


The mountains seem too great, where we travel the rough road is too difficult for us alone. Come, Lord Jesus.

Learn from the Hymns – Christmas Carol Edition!

The theme for our hymn/bible study during December will be "Christmas Throughout the Ages." We will be exploring the Advent and Christmas hymns from the Renaissance period through modern day carols.

Many people are surprised to find out that a number of Christmas tunes sung today came from the Renaissance period. Songs such as Lo How a Rose E're Blooming, Pat-a-pan, In Dulci Jubilo (Good Christian Friends, Rejoice), Il est ne (He is born), The Holly and the Ivy, and Noel Nouvelet (Sing We Now of Christmas - we also know the text Now the Green Blade Rises) were sung by madrigal choirs and played by wandering minstrels throughout Europe in town centers and royal courts.

The Baroque period brings us many French *Noels*, Bach's Christmas Cantatas (such as *Sheep May Safely Graze*), *Bring a Torch Jeanette Isabella*, and *Savior of the Nations Come*.

The *Messiah* is probably the most familiar (and most overdone) Christmas piece from the Classical period, and of course everyone knows *Joy to the World*.

By the Romantic period and 20th century, composers continued to write new tunes such as Mendelssohn's *Hark! The Herald Angels Sing*, but they were also taking many older tunes and writing large symphonic works on them. Ralph Vaughan Williams composed a beautiful piece for vocal soloist and orchestra based on the song *On Christmas Night All Christians Sing*.

We will also look at how traditional folk tunes were used in various countries. Away in a Manger comes from North America, Infant Holy, Infant Lowly comes from Poland, On Christmas Night all Christians Sing is a traditional English tune, and Angels We Have Heard on High is a traditional French carol.

Classes are 12/8 and 12/15 at 7:00 PM. We meet on Zoom. I look forward to seeing you there!

HCLC COVID-19 UPDATE November 2020



While restrictions on worship have eased, the guidance from the Virginia Governor's office is that members are still safer at home. With that in mind, Holy Cross will continue to provide Sunday morning worship services in an online format.

As we move forward with our COVID response we are offering worship in the sanctuary on Wednesday evenings. The safety precautions being taken are: medical grade air filters in the HVAC system, two stand-alone air purifiers in the aisle, sanitization of the sanctuary Tuesday evenings, 100% mask wearing, greater than six feet social distancing, no singing, no sharing of the peace and anyone with COVID symptoms is not to enter the building.

Dear HCLC Family ~

Thank you to everyone who participated in the **November 15**th **Annual Congregational Meeting.** We exceeded our quorum (10% of confirmed members) and were able to successfully conduct the business of the Church via Zoom. We approved an austere budget for 2021, but authorized Council to vote to restore the budget (as proposed in the letter sent home to the Congregation) to more normal levels, including restoring staff salaries, should commitments and giving support doing so.

Congratulations to those elected to serve at last week's meeting! We had three Council positions to fill. These positions were all filled with unanimous support by those in attendance.

The nominating team consists of six members. As we only had three members on the ballot, we asked for volunteers during the Annual Meeting and received two - Hope Russell and Emily Moran. The Council subsequently met on November 16th and voted unanimously to approve their membership on the 2021 Nominating Team. If you are interested in serving on the nominating team for 2021, please let Sam Carter or me know. This is a great opportunity to make a very meaningful contribution to the work of Holy Cross, without a large time commitment.

A word about the **2021 Budget.** Sam and the Finance Team worked tirelessly to develop an appropriate, fiscally-responsible budget for next year. You'll recall that the proposed budget offers two scenarios - a worst-case, austere budget and a restored budget, in which a number of areas are made whole. For those who have already submitted pledges, thank you! To those who were able to increase their pledged giving for next year, thank you so much!! If you haven't yet submitted a pledge card for next year, please take a moment to do so. Your pledges make it possible for us to develop a meaningful plan. Without them, our staff will all take a 10% cut in salary. On the surface, 10% doesn't sound like much, but when I think about giving 10% more, I know it will make a huge difference for our staff. Please consider doing so, if you are able. Whether or not you are able to commit financially to Holy Cross in the coming year, please pray for our church.

On a more upbeat note, we are thrilled to be planning this year's **Christmas Eve Worship Services** outdoors. All CDC guidelines will be observed (social distancing, wearing masks, etc.) Keep watch for an opportunity to "reserve" your spot at one of our four services! If you have a knack for hanging Christmas lights, please join me on Sunday, December 13th after worship to help prepare the outdoor sanctuary!

And now, dear friends, it's time for me to turn over the responsibility of Council President to the new leadership team. I pray you will be as supportive and gracious to them as you have been to me. It's been an honor and deeply emotionally gratifying opportunity to serve as your VP & President the last four years. I am optimistic for the future of Holy Cross.

Advent Gift Drive

After discovering the significant number of homeless youth living in Loudoun County, Donna Fortier started Mobile Hope in 2011 as a special project at Inova Loudoun Hospital. Donna began distributing clothing, food and hygiene items to youth in need on the hospital's mobile bus.

Mobile Hope broke away from Inova and became an independent 501(c)3 organization in 2012, missioned to serve homeless and atrisk youth up to age 24. Mobile Hope provides services without restrictive policies and excessive red tape. They ensure their eligibility process is straightforward and does not serve as a barrier to services. They meet each kid where they are, regardless of barriers, issues and traumas.

They believe every youth has unrealized potential and are honored to stand with kids on their journey from homelessness to self-sufficiency.

Mobile Hope provides a non-judgmental and non-discriminatory environment where youth develop a sense of purpose and

community. They provide intense and individualized case management to address the issues that led to homelessness. They believe in helping youth become leaders through providing volunteer opportunities in their bus outreach program, Listen for the Honk, organic peer to peer experiences as well as in their onsite thrift shop and retail training center, Threads of Hope. Here is a list of items to donate:

Hygiene Items: Diapers, chapsticks, shampoo, dry shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, shaving cream, toothbrushes, toothpaste, feminine hygiene products, brushes, combs, tissues and hand warmers.

Students participate in our weekly Zoom classes. In addition, we email them their weekly lessons with a link to review our Zoom class recordings. It's been difficult for students to do the reviews on their cell phones or borrowing their children's school laptop. They are now able to open their very own laptops anytime and check out the previous lesson, which prepares them for the following week's class.

It is a heart-warming experience to give the students their computer. Most of them think they have to pay for the computers or return them at some point. They are extremely happy to learn they are theirs to keep. One student came with a large bag to hold her new computer. She opened her backpack and removed a large soft shirt, covered her laptop with the shirt and put it in the

bag. It showed how precious the laptop is for each and every student.


We enrolled two new students who before the pandemic used to drive our students to church. They are now students of our ELL classes. Our student population increased from 10 to 22 between September 16th and mid-November. More are planning to join us or when they work at night, they plan to use our class lessons and videos.

We have two students in our intermediate class who moved to other states. One lives in California, the other in Florida. Both students were delighted to join our Zoom class. The Florida student's wife also joined our class.

We had several students and their family members contract COVID-19. Most are doing well now, but a couple are still very weak and are not able to join our classes at this time. Hopefully, they can soon.

As always, thank you to our teachers, Suzanne, Dayna, Jeanne and Chip, who do an excellent job teaching our students and helping those that have problems using Zoom.

Herndon Village Network (HVN) is a local nonprofit that provides free transportation to doctor's office visits, stores, restaurants and more for Herndon's Senior Citizens who are 55 and older and live in the 20170-zip code. HVN began in 2014 and has continued to grow. Last year, 46 volunteers provided 908 rides to medical appointments. The need was so great, the volunteers began a program delivering grocery bags of shelf stable meals for older adults in the village. Herndon Village Network's motto is, "Neighbors helping neighbors one ride at a time."

A NEW LENS FOR GENEROSITY

Sharing God's gifts with one another through stewardship is an integral part of the Lutheran faith. But sometimes stewardship is misunderstood, equated simply with giving money rather than sharing time, spirit and love. Linda Staats is trying to change that with the Generosity Project, a stewardship resource funded in part by Mission Support.

Developed through a partnership between Staats, the Rocky Mountain Synod and the churchwide organization, the Generosity Project challenges Lutherans to rethink stewardship through innovative, intergenerational programming.

When Diane Krauszer, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Palmer, Alaska, introduced her congregation to the Generosity Project two years ago, it shifted perspectives.

"One [person] exclaimed, "We never talked about any of this when I was a kid, and I wish we had," Krauszer said. Believing this resource could benefit neighbors at Epiphany Lutheran Episcopal Church, Valdez, Alaska, she took a cue from the project and shared it with them.

In 2019, Krauszer partnered with Kaitlin Pabo-Eulberg, Epiphany's pastor, to introduce the blended Lutheran-Episcopal congregation and a neighboring Catholic church to the Generosity Project.

"It [was] a very natural partnership to invite them," Pabo-Eulberg said of Epiphany's Catholic neighbors. "They were really excited to talk about giving from their perspective." The event included participants ranging in age from 8 to 89, and Pabo-Eulberg recalled enthusiastic listening and understanding across the generations.

Among them were Epiphany members Donna Newcomer, a baby boomer, and Steve Newcomer, of the Greatest Generation. "[Now] every time somebody comes to [our] house, when they leave, I say, 'Thank you for spending time with us," Donna said. "Because that's the greatest thing you can give somebody — they noticed you and spent time with you."

Staats said this new lens for generosity is the project's aim.

"The goal is not to increase giving by a percentage," she said. "The goal is to change the culture in a congregation [and in homes]. We're building a culture to bring all generations together ... and equipping the home as a place where generosity is practiced."
