Independence Day!



The Fourth of July—also known as Independence Day or July 4th—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution. On July 2nd, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later delegates from the 13 colonies adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. From 1776 to the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues. The Fourth of July 2021 is on Sunday, July 4, 2021; the federal holiday will be observed on Monday, July 5, 2021.

Did you know? John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and would reportedly turn down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826—the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.



It Is Well with My Soul

For the past few months I am have been talking about hymns that remind us of growing up and bring back fond memories of home. Throughout the summer I would like to take advantage of worshiping in person again and sing some of these songs in each service. One of my favorite things to do as the music director of Holy Cross is to play hymn songs. It is the best way for me to learn what hymns are personal favorites within the congregation. Please take a moment to send me a list of your favorite hymns that bring back fond memories. If you would also like to include a short description of what this hymn makes you think of, I would love to read it.

One of my favorite hymns from growing up is *It Is Well with My Soul*, also known as *When Peace Like a River*. The first time I remember hearing this hymn was at a church service with my parents while we lived in Dansville, NY, a town just south of Rochester. I would have been around eight at this time. I still remember listening to the beautiful melody and harmonies. The only text that I can remember picking up on was the refrain, "It is well, with my soul. It is well, it is well, with my soul." At an older age I started picking up on the meaning of the rest of the words. I later read a story about why Horatio Spafford wrote this song. Horatio was heavily invested in real estate in Chicago, IL. During the fires of 1871 he lost his entire fortune. At the same time, he lost his son at the age of four. Horatio decided to pour himself into his work and began assisting the nearly 100,000 people who had been left homeless.

A few years later Horatio decided to take his family to England on a vacation. However, Horatio was held up in New York and decided to send his family on ahead. Horatio's wife and four daughters settled into a cabin aboard the French liner *Ville du Havre*. On its voyage to Europe it crashed into another ship and sank within two hours. The only survivor from Horatio's family was his wife. Horatio immediately began his way over to comfort his wife. On his journey he was able to sit in meditation and think about his life. He was so deep in his faith in the Lord that he said to himself, "It is well; the will of God be done." He later went on to write the rest of the hymn, *It Is Well with My Soul*.

It is hard to imagine that someone can have as strong a faith in God as Horatio did. He lost all his money in the fires of Chicago, his son shortly after, and his four daughters less than three years after that. *It Is Well with My Soul* has become so much more important to me in my faith after finding this story and rereading the hymns text.

Last month I expressed optimism that we would have a plan to responsibly re-open very soon; that optimism was wellfounded, and we have resumed in-person worship – Hallelujah! During our long absence, we increased our worshipping community to include those who were not in close geographical proximity to our building in addition to offering a live worship opportunity for those whose circumstances preclude physical attendance.

Just as we learned "on-the-fly" how to livestream, we are now learning how to offer both in-person and online worship experiences that provide the best possible experience to both audiences while minimizing the intrusion of technology. I don't think any of us want people strolling around with cameras, microphone booms, lighting arrays, etc. to interfere with worship. Consequently, volunteers are in the process of "permanently" installing the cables, wiring, cameras, etc. that were just out of camera range when our only option was livestreaming; please bear with us as we effect those changes.

If the pandemic has taught us anything, it's that engagement and not mere physical attendance is a far more relevant measure of spiritual growth. As we move forward, we're seeing that we can retain the best aspects of our traditions while incorporating new ones.

We have received notification from our supplier that work on the Steeple Bells is being scheduled. We have confirmed to them that their required electrical supply connections are in place, and that seems to be our final hurdle. In related news, Jeremy had our pianos tuned, and the choir is rehearsing and sounds GREAT! It's wonderful to "get the band back together" as we enter our next chapter of "being the church!"

Once again, giving has remained strong, and pledges towards the Building on the Best capital campaign continue to be on track – THANK YOU for providing the resources that enable all that we do! And thank you for being a caring community of faith with your ongoing outpouring of food and clothing donations. Thank you for your continued generosity in so many areas!

Finally, I wasn't sure how some of my recent comments on social issues would be received, but my concerns were unfounded. Several of you spoke with me directly, and it seems many of us have had similar experiences. As a member congregation of The Closet, Holy Cross is responsible for providing volunteers to assist with the daily operations of The Closet. Whether helping customers on the sales floor, receiving donations, sorting and tagging donations, or putting priced donations out on the floor, volunteers are needed in all these jobs.

At this time, congregational volunteers are not assigned for specific days of service. Instead, volunteers are urged to use the recently simplified version of SignUpGenius. Accessible through The Closet's webpage, <u>theclosetofgreaterherndon.org/volunteer</u>, SignUpGenuis enables volunteers to commit to serve for specific blocks of time on specific days. Upon arrival at The Closet, volunteers will be assigned a job that they feel comfortable doing that needs to be done that day. Requests to work in a particular area will be honored, if possible.

When volunteering at The Closet, volunteers should sign in which will then allow Holy Cross to receive credit for your service that day. For staff and volunteers who are fully vaccinated, mask-wearing at The Closet is optional.

We started our summer English classes June 9th and will continue teaching for 8 weeks until July 28th. So far, 12 students are attending. We usually have fewer students during the summer, and it looks like about the same as other years when we taught at church in our classrooms. Longer daylight hours keep our students working longer hours. They may also visit their home countries to see their families.

As a comparison, we had 47 registered students for our spring semester in 2020. We had 34 registered students for our spring semester in 2021. I'm sure giving our students donated computers helped tremendously and we are very grateful for the wonderful gift.

We like to review our previous lessons and mix them with something new during each summer session. Our students are as eager as ever to learn and speak English well. They enjoy learning grammar and vocabulary based on timely stories. They are also great participants in conversation based on the topic of the week.

In the Basic English class Chip's student, Elizabeth, told everyone about her son's graduation from elementary school. All the

students were happy to celebrate the good news with her. Many students have attended classes for a long time. Several have become friends; sometimes they are as close as family members with each other. They socialize and help each other when help is needed. Holy Cross' ELL classes are not just rewarding for the students, but also for our great team of teachers.


- 1. Drop a check in the mail or bring your offering with you to communion on the 1st and 3rd Sundays.

STORIES OF FAITH IN ACTION 2020-21



Outlaw Ranch's Connecting Cultures at Camp program brought together longtime camp families with new camp families from Pueblo de Dios, an ELCA congregation in Sioux Falls, S.D.

CONNECTING CULTURES AT CAMP

When Matt Rusch, director of Outlaw Ranch, first proposed a family camp connecting cultures, he started from scratch. "We just jumped into this," he said. "[There was] no model. We [thought], 'We know God is in the mix, so somehow it will work out."

The idea was to make family camp look like the church in South Dakota, which is both multilingual and racially diverse, he said.

Outlaw Ranch partnered with Pueblo de Dios, a congregation in Sioux Falls, and invited Spanish-speaking families to join with Englishspeaking families for the camp's weeklong Connecting Cultures program. Outlaw Ranch is a member of Lutherans Outdoors in South Dakota, which receives funding from the ELCA South Dakota Synod made available because of Mission Support.

In addition to enjoying faith-based programming, families in Connecting Cultures could hike, ride horses and take trips to nearby Mount Rushmore and travel to Custer High **School for fireworks exhibitions. That in itself** was a blessing, said Maria Cabello, pastor of Pueblo de Dios.

"[Our] people feel very happy and very joyful with Outlaw Ranch ... and [they] feel very happy with God. Hispanic people don't have a week vacation [often]," she said. "It [was] very exciting to renew our spirit and renew our souls at Outlaw Ranch."

Connecting Cultures also helped some gain confidence. "Especially the kids," Cabello

said. "[Some] speak only Spanish. They feel like a little fish in the ocean. But because others were speaking Spanish, they feel more included at camp."

Instead of being embarrassed to try to use the Spanish they learned in high school years earlier, English-speaking adults utilized bilingual counselors to converse freely with Latino families. And Spanish-speaking adults who had never gone camping learned the ropes from English-speaking veterans who'd been camping for decades.

THE IDEA WAS TO MAKE FAMILY Camp Look Like the Church in South Dakota, which is both Multilingual and racially Diverse, rusch said.

"Camp is a wonderful equalizer," Rusch said. "There's not one of the groups who's on unequal footing here, not anyone is not out of their element. ... We all study the same Bible; we worship the same God. We try to address those things instead of the differences at the beginning."
