

*We need you in the Choir!!!* Due to the transient nature of the Metro DC area, we have lost a number of choir members since I have been here. It is time to once again, fill the choir seats!!!

As the summer ends and the school year begins so do choir rehearsals. It is my goal to fill every seat in the choir area this year! In order to do that – *We Need You in the Choir!!!* 

We gather every Thursday from 7:00 – 8:00 PM (starting in September) and we sing at the 8:30 AM service on first/third Sundays and at the 11:00 AM service on second/fourth Sundays.

A lot of people think they can't sing or aren't good enough for the choir. If you can sing a hymn, you can join the choir! There are confident voices throughout the choir to sit next to and help you get acclimated.

So, you may be thinking, "What exactly is the role of the choir in worship?" or, "Why is the choir so important that you need *me* to be a part of it?" The following passage is taken from the ELCA's statement on the role of choirs in worship:

"Obviously, the choir has a variety of responsibilities. Their primary role is to support and enhance the congregation in song. As such, the choir becomes an important leader in worship, guiding the gathered assembly in prayer and praise through song.

Do our choirs need to be filled with professional singers? Absolutely not! Any choir can sing well, provided the music is appropriate to their skill level and they are well-trained and rehearsed. Music that is simple and well taught provides choirs with a means to get beyond the mechanics and give heartfelt expression to the text. This music, in turn, can provide the whole assembly with a means truly to encounter God in its worship.

The choir may be called upon to act as teacher, to help the assembly learn new hymnody and musical settings of the liturgy; if the congregation is to learn new music quickly and accurately, the people must have enthusiastic and competent leadership. Above all, the well-rehearsed choir will breathe life into the text as it sings with clear understanding and insight into the words and their meaning. The texts can shape the faith of those who worship."

If you have any questions about the choir, please do not hesitate to pull me aside on a Sunday morning or give me a call at the office. You can always talk to any of the current choir members. They would love to have you as much as I would!

Please prayerfully consider this opportunity to express your faith and offer your talents to HCLC.

# **COUNCIL**



Holy Cross Family -

There is a temptation for those of us who've spent the majority of their adult lives in the business world to view things from that perspective. For example, when one is evaluating the credit worthiness of a company, a determination as to whether or not it is a "going concern" (i.e., will it be able to meet its financial obligations for the foreseeable future?) is of paramount importance. When we refinanced the Church's mortgage, the lender was persuaded that we would continue to be a good credit risk based on our record of financial responsibility as well as current giving; little did we know that we would be tested with a pandemic within a year! I'm happy to report that the PPP Loan/grant, your faithful giving, and some distasteful austerity measures saw us through the worst of the storm, and it appears that we are poised to develop a budget for next year that is more in line with what we've come to expect. Thank YOU for your faithfulness!

When it comes to churches, there is another dimension of being a "going concern." Is the church's demographic profile consistent with long term viability? We are facing challenges in this area. The cost of living in our area is such that people who were in their peak earning (and giving) years often retire and move away. Our church assessment efforts a few years back identified the need to attract and retain new members, and that is more important than ever if we are to be a viable church. Sure, long term financial viability is a

concern, but, frankly, that is irrelevant if we are not spiritually viable and alive! Too many have seen the way many who call themselves "Christian" do the opposite of following Jesus and, consequently, want no part of it. We have the opportunity to counter the messages of hate and bigotry with the actual "Good News!" It is so impressive to see the active involvement of our church in the community. I also believe that a truly welcoming and inclusive church which celebrates the diversity of ALL of God's children in living the Gospel cannot help but grow both spiritually and in numbers, and I'm glad we're on that path. Actions are a far more persuasive witness to the love of Christ than any haranguing sermon shouted from a street corner! It is so refreshing and fulfilling to see and live with the 'love in action" being manifested by our members; thanks be to God!

May the Holy Spirit continue to use and guide us as we attempt to follow Jesus.



## Coming Soon – Community Conversations!



When the Call Committee interviewed Pastor Martin in 2019, he shared his experience with a program he developed at Joy Lutheran Church. The program involved inviting people into the church to talk about community issues.

Holy Cross is building on that program to launch "Community Conversations – Understanding Our Neighbors". The purpose of the Community Conversations program is to develop a deeper

understanding of our neighbors, with a focus on those who are frequently marginalized or misunderstood. We aspire to learn more about their journey, to openly discuss how they are marginalized or misunderstood, and work toward relationships that transcend our differences and celebrate God's love for us all.

Holy Cross will host our first event on Tuesday, September 28th at 7pm. Our first Community Conversation will be with our Muslim neighbors. The presentation will be followed by a question-andanswer period, then refreshments in the Fellowship Hall. The event will also be streamed for those who prefer to watch from home.

Potential future conversations will include: Understanding our Neighbors of Color; Understanding our Latinx Neighbors; Understanding our LGBTQ Neighbors; Understanding our Homeless & Hungry Neighbors; Understanding our Neighbors with Disabilities; Understanding our Neighbors with Mental Health or Addiction Challenges, and Understanding our Asian Neighbors.



# A SPIRITUAL HOME For future leaders

Stuck in traffic at West Virginia University (WVU), when seemingly all of Morgantown's 28,000 students are trying to get to class, you'd be hard-pressed not to notice the fire engine red Lutheran Campus Ministry Chapel with its curved roof, just south of the main crosswalk.

"The building was very interesting; that was probably my first impression," sophomore Lilly Simmons said.

The architectural oddity might draw students for a brief chat with Tony Setley, campus pastor, but however they come, he said, "they are comfortable enough to ask questions, and that can always lead to something bigger."

#### Graduate student Nathan Blake recalled his first

visit. "I was at a really rough place spiritually, and the time for normal Sunday services had already passed, and I was like, 'I need something, but I don't know what.'I remembered that 6 p.m. service time, and I wandered up the hill, snuck in the back [pew] and I just kept coming. It was exactly what I needed."

In and beyond worship, Setley encourages students to set the tone for campus ministry. Simmons said she's loved leading monthly social activities such as ax-throwing or miniature golf. The gatherings make a **difference. "I can't overstate the importance** of having a place where you can experience spirituality, but also having a group of people you can experience it with," Blake said.

home for some people discerning calls to ministry. The student housing, called <u>Luther.</u> <u>House</u>, is located behind the chapel in a building that was formerly the parsonage for St. Paul Lutheran Church of Morgantown. Luther House students will lead chapel and explore seminary through a partnership with Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa. Both the seminary and campus ministry are funded by Mission Support.

"Hopefully out of that, students will have some of the financial burden taken off, but also to have that ability to discern and engage with their faith in a way that will give them more answers to the questions about what God is calling them to do in this world," Setley said.
