

STAFF NEWS



Dear Friends in Jesus,

A recent article¹ I read used a term that describes what many of us may feel right now: "emotional whiplash." Not that long ago we were, individually and collectively, seeing a light at the end of a long COVID tunnel, only to have our hopes dashed as the variants run rampant. According to the article, health care providers are noticing huge upticks in reports of depression and anxiety, particularly among the vaccinated whose hopes for going back to normal have been crushed by the new resurgences. As I wrote last month, it is more than discouraging. Last May, I assumed that at our August meeting, the Council would vote on whether we felt safe to take masks off in worship. Instead, we voted on an updated policy on mask wearing.

As we continue to move forward, I would list three suggestions that may be helpful for our overall health, both as individuals and as a congregation. First, it is okay to recognize and admit our frustrations, grief, and anxiety. These are not indicators of weakness or lack of faith. They are natural, God-given human responses to a situation that is chaotic and over which we perceive that we have little control. After 17 months of altering every aspect of our lives only to see it all start over again, we are tired, and we are afraid. Recognizing that we are certainly not "back to normal" is a starting point in giving ourselves and one another a little latitude when our minds and hearts feel overwhelmed at times.

Second, it is important to be aware of how this general anxiety marks us and our decision making. As the article states, we have been hypervigilant for some time — in prime "fight or flight" mode. That is natural. Where it begins to get unhealthy is when our anxiety feeds into our perception and decision making, pushing them farther from what is real. In other words, we may be prone to overreact. We also may find ourselves less willing or able to listen to someone else's point of view, straining relationships, and hampering healthy planning processes.

Third, maintaining a sense of deep hope helps protect us from despair and degeneration. Drawing on his own experience in the Nazi concentration camps, the great neurologist and psychiatrist, Viktor Frankl, made the concept of hope a key component of his teaching, writing, "Those who have a 'why' for living can bear with almost any 'how.'"² We are Resurrection people, a people claimed, called, and being continually reformed in the promise of a Jesus who has overcome the power that seek to separate us from God's love and care. Jesus is our center. Jesus is our hope. Especially as a

community of faith, we will need to seek ever more diligently to center that hope in our lives to maintain our focus in the days and weeks ahead. We go forward in hope. We go forward in mission. We go forward in love.

Policy of Mask Wearing
in the Time of COVID

Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love. — I Corinthians 16: 13-14

Holy Cross Lutheran Church (HCLC) observes the mandates regarding indoor gatherings, including the wearing of masks, set forth by our local government officials (The Commonwealth of Virginia, and the County of Fairfax). For the sake of further caution and safety and with love and compassion for our neighbors, we may also implement stricter policies for HCLC gatherings.

As of August 16, 2021, the following policies have been established by the Congregational Council of HCLC:

 At all HCLC sponsored gatherings that are held indoor open to the public – worship, fellowship events, etc. - masks are required for all participants. The exception for worship being that the worship leaders may unmask only while they are in

- the Chancel area since they are a safe distance away from the rest of the congregation.
- 2. Smaller HCLC meetings, such as committees, and other small gatherings (that are thereby not generally considered open to the overall public), may meet unmasked <u>provided that all participants are vaccinated and agree to meet without masks</u>. <u>If one member is uncomfortable with being unmasked, all must be masked</u>.
- 3. HCLC rents our facility to other groups that meet on a regular basis. Our agreement with them is that they abide by county and state mandates. Currently, they are free to gather within those mandates without masks.
- 4. If a rental group and a HCLC group happen to be in the building at the same time, masks should be worn in passing and physical distancing should be maintained.
- 5. This policy will be updated, changed, or dismissed as circumstances warrant.

New Welcome Statement Meeting September 14th



Back in June, we debuted the draft of a new welcome statement for Holy Cross Lutheran that is intentional in our affirmation of all our siblings in God including all expressions of race, relational status, sexual orientation, economic status, and gender. At that time, we also stated that the summer would be a time for people to think through their opinion and that in the fall, we would have a "town hall" style meeting to listen, ask questions, and raise any concerns.

The time for that meeting is **Tuesday, September 14 at 7:00 pm**. This will be a hybrid type meeting with masked people welcome to gather in the sanctuary and a Zoom link for others who would prefer to join from home. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION



This fall we will be offering Confirmation instruction. Confirmation is typically a two-year program of spiritual and faith development offered to Middle School members (7th and 8th grade, especially) that offers a deeper exploration into the basics of our Christian faith and our Lutheran heritage, expression, and worship. The first year introduces the leaners to the Bible and highlights the key stories of God and God's people, especially the central saving event of Jesus Christ and his reconciling work for us all. Year two highlights the story of Martin Luther, a 16th century Augustinian monk who struggled to find peace with God. The story of his encounter with God's grace and unconditional love and the subsequent Reformation it began, is deeply woven into our theology and practice today. During this second year, we will use Luther's Small Catechism and his teachings on the basics of Christian faith.



Community Conversations Understanding our Muslim Neighbors

Holy Cross is launching a new program called "Community Conversations – Understanding Our Neighbors". The purpose of the Community Conversations program is to develop a deeper understanding of our neighbors, with a focus on those who are frequently marginalized or misunderstood. We aspire to learn more about their journey, to openly discuss how they are marginalized or misunderstood, and work toward relationships that transcend our differences and celebrate God's love for us all.

Holy Cross will host our first event on Tuesday, September 28th at 7 PM. Our first Community Conversation will be with our Muslim



neighbors. We are honored to welcome Ms

Hurunnessa Fariad, head of Outreach at the All Dulles Area **Muslim Society** (ADAMS Center). Ms. Fariad serves as the Director of Outreach for Multi-Faith Neighbor's Network, Ms. Fariad is the Secretary of the Board of Directors at Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy. Leadership Circle for One America

Movement, Member of the Fairfax County Faith and Equity Committee, and involved with many other faith-based organizations. She is also the founder & Music Director of America's first Mosque Youth Choir, The ADAMS BEAT Choir. Ms. Fariad is the founder and co-host of the Sister Act Podcast along with co-hosts Dr. Sabrina Dent and Rabbi Susan Shankman.

In our first conversation, we will explore common myths & stereotypes about Muslims. We will talk about injustice and bigotry they experience. And we will talk about stigma, rights, and social justice issues and how our faiths address these topics.

The presentation will be followed by a question-and-answer period, then refreshments in the Fellowship Hall. The event will also be streamed for those who prefer to watch from home.

Our legacy of compassionate service has made a difference in the lives of hundreds of thousands of people who have found safety and hope in America's communities. Our history reflects American Lutherans' deep immigrant roots and passionate commitment to welcoming newcomers, especially those who are most in need.

Through the <u>Long Welcome</u>, we help ensure that refugees and migrants are protected, embraced, and empowered in a world of just and welcoming communities.

We are calling for volunteers to support incoming Afghan Allies, Special Immigrant Visa holders, who are being evacuated to the United States. Afghan Allies are mostly arriving in a few specific regions; however, we want to be ready to welcome these families wherever they go!

English Language Learners (ELL) Classes via Zoom



We have completed our online summer semester. The summer semester was June 9 - July 28. We teach three classes: Beginners, Basics, and Intermediate English via Zoom, three times a year. Our 2020 fall semester was September 15 - December 16, and our 2021 winter semester was January 13 - April 28.

Every teacher now has virtual teaching experience. We always strive to make our classes interesting and keep the students engaged. During the spring and summer semesters our intermediate English class learned about endangered animals, which teaches students the English names of many animals and their environments. They also learned about the birth of the new panda bear at the National Zoo, and watching the baby panda in YouTube clips.

Students enjoyed learning about the emerging 17-year-old cicadas earlier this spring. This was a brand-new species for them, which generated a lot of questions. We had excellent student participation with our agree/disagree lessons. Students liked it so much that we continued with this lesson with multiple classes. Most importantly, they learned how to stop a discussion if it became uncomfortable and how to diplomatically ask for further explanations to understand a person's opinions. They shared their different experiences on the subject of 'happy/unhappy renters'. The

students were very interested in phrasal verbs. We plan to teach more of them during the upcoming fall semester.

Many times, we do not get to finish planned lessons because questions lead us into different areas and subjects. The teachers enjoy those types of discussions and try to answer all questions, or we'll research it and continue the topic in the next class. The students provided several suggestions when asked what they needed to help them speak and understand English better. We try to help them as much as possible even when topics like problems with internet connections come up that are not part of the curriculum.

We would love to return to in-person instructions, but during our teacher's meeting we have decided to wait awhile longer due to the Delta variant spreading rapidly. We look forward to our fall semester which starts Wednesday, September 15, 2021.

A very special thank you to our teachers for always being ready to teach each week. Dayna, Chip, Suzanne, and Jeanne, you are essential to our successful ELL program, and we appreciate you very much!
