

A Community of Intentional Welcome

Not too long ago, I happened to attend worship at another ELCA congregation. After worship, as we began to empty out of the sanctuary, I noticed some of the members of the congregation speaking to two other people. They were visitors that day and appeared to me to be a mother and her teen-aged daughter. While I wasn't able to catch all of their conversation, I was able to hear this statement from the mother: "When we saw the rainbow flag, we said, 'This looks like a place that would be safe for us.'"

It was June, Pride month, and the congregation had hung a homemade Pride flag on their fence nearest the street in support of their LGBTQ neighbors. But for these two people, that was signal enough that this would be a congregation where they would be safe that day.

Since then, I have wondered a lot about the back story of those two visitors and what brought them to that particular congregation on that Sunday, but I've come to the conclusion that no matter their situation, they were two of my siblings in Christ looking for refuge, grace, and sanctuary in the face of an overall religious context that is often just the opposite. On that day, because of that congregation's intentional sign of welcome, they found a safe place where they knew they were welcomed and embraced.

This example helps to illustrates why I feel that we at Holy Cross should move forward with an intentional welcome to our LGBTQ siblings:

To be intentionally welcoming and affirming, and to be sensitive to the fear and caution many LGBTQ people and their families have regarding entering a church building.

As a congregation, we have been examining a proposed welcome statement, one that intentionally welcomes all people, particularly those who have all too often found that congregations' "all are welcome" does not, in fact, include them.

Adopting such a welcome statement would also allow us to apply to be a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation, something that I think we should pursue. "Reconciling in Christ" is a designation that indicates that a congregation is *intentionally* welcoming and affirming to people who identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bi-Sexual, Transgender, or Queer (LGBTQ) as well as being committed to engaging in education and dialogue that furthers racial understanding.

Being an RIC congregation allows them to be put on a searchable database, so that people seeking a church can see which Lutheran congregations in their area have gone through the process of being designated "Reconciling in Christ." It helps many to know that this is a *safe* place for them. It also allows LGBTQ allies to find congregations that share their intentional values of welcome and safety. Furthermore, it says to us as a congregation and to our local

community, as a whole, that we are a faith community that is seeking to end racial discrimination.

There is a *justice* element to this move, in that it speaks intentionally to ourselves, and to our wider community that we believe Jesus' love embraces and affirms all people, that all forms of discrimination are not part of who we are at HCLC, and that we are ready to act on that. There is also a strong *evangelistic* element aspect, proclaiming to ourselves and our neighbors (many of whom have given up on church and organized religion) that we are a community of faith that values all people and that we are serious about being intentional in that welcome. Sociologists and other people who study contemporary culture inform us that especially among people born after 1981, church is often seen as overly restrictive, judgmental, homophobic, and indifferent to creation. They are often turned off from church before they even come in. So, they don't. They've moved on.

Being a church that is designated Reconciling in Christ signals that we are different from the congregations that many people have experienced. It is a sign that they are safe. Like the mother and daughter I saw in June, many people would love to connect with a congregation that shares their values and openly affirms all people in love.

As we move to adopt the welcome statement at our annual meeting in November, I would urge us to vote to move forward in being officially designated a Reconciling in Christ congregation.

As always, it is my honor to serve with and among you.

Holy Cross Lutheran Church Policy of Mask Wearing in the Time of COVID

Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong.

Let all that you do be done in love.

I Corinthians 16: 13-14

Holy Cross Lutheran Church (HCLC) observes the mandates regarding indoor gatherings, including the wearing of masks, set forth by our local government officials (The Commonwealth of Virginia, and the County of Fairfax). For the sake of further caution and safety and with love and compassion for our neighbors, we may also implement stricter policies for HCLC gatherings.

As of August 16, 2021, the following policies have been established by the Congregational Council of HCLC:

1. At all HCLC sponsored gatherings that are held indoor open to the public – worship, fellowship events, etc. - masks are required for all participants. The exception for worship being that the worship leaders may unmask only while they

- are in the Chancel area since they are a safe distance away from the rest of the congregation.
- 2. Smaller HCLC meetings, such as committees, and other small gatherings (that are thereby not generally considered open to the overall public), may meet unmasked <u>provided</u> that all participants are vaccinated and agree to meet without masks. If one member is uncomfortable with being unmasked, all must be masked.
- 3. HCLC rents our facility to other groups that meet on a regular basis. Our agreement with them is that they abide by county and state mandates. Currently, they are free to gather within those mandates without masks.
- 4. If a rental group and a HCLC group happen to be in the building at the same time, masks should be worn in passing and physical distancing should be maintained.
- 5. This policy will be updated, changed, or dismissed as circumstances warrant.

WORSHIP



With the concerns so many of us have regarding the resurge in COVID infections, we are committed to maintaining Drive-Up Communion for as long as people need it. Now that we have gone back to two services again, we do need to make some changes to the format.



English Language Learners (ELL) Classes via Zoom



Our 2021 fall semester started September 15th and will continue until December 8th. We decided to continue teaching online via Zoom. Unfortunately, we cannot trust that every student is vaccinated. Our teachers would love to teach in our classrooms again, but it's too risky with the Delta variant.

We have a few new students in class. I offered English classes to a couple of lifeguards at my pool who are from Columbia. They are very eager to speak and read better English. We also have three new students from El Salvador, two of whom are cousins of one of our students in our Basic class. We looked forward to seeing most of our students return to class. They are hardworking and very determined to learn and understand English and are always interested to learn more about our customs so they can assimilate in to our culture.

We taught a total of 34 students during our 2021 spring semester. There are always fewer students during the summer and this year was no exception with only 20 students. Students typically, work longer hours due to extended daylight hours. Some like to take breaks from class, while others visit their families in their home countries.

As you know, the system controlling the steeple bells and the striking mechanism reached their end of life and became non-functional while we were dealing with all of the challenges (financial and otherwise) facing us as the reality of COVID became clear. In April, Verdin Company offered us a substantial discount on the repairs and required new equipment. Even though the steeple bells have been a special part of our life here at Holy Cross for many years, there simply wasn't money in the budget to cover this expense. We decided to hold a special appeal to raise the funds to take advantage of the offer. Once again, members of Holy Cross came through, and we were able to place the order as summer began.

Delays in manufacturing moved the delivery out into August, and we were informed that their technician wouldn't be able to make it to Holy Cross until well into September. We verified the necessary electrical circuits were in place, and, after some back and forth, we were assured the installation would take place in time for our special September 11th Remembrance Service.

Late in the morning on the Tuesday after Labor Day, we were informed that the Verdin technician would only handle the replacement of the striker and interconnection of Verdin controls; physical installation of the Verdin Bell Controller and Controller interface units and all 120V and 208V electrical connections were the responsibility of Holy Cross and must be completed prior to the arrival of the technician. They apologized for not telling us of these requirements and asked if we needed to reschedule our Thursday, September 9th appointment. After some phone calls with their technical department, we assured them we'd have things in place before Thursday, since it was their only available date before September 11th. After lots of work and a few trips to Dulles Electric on Tuesday and Wednesday, the Verdin equipment was physically installed and hardwired into our electrical panel.

On Thursday, we worked with the Verdin technician to complete the installation, including a remote capability. Thursday afternoon saw us annoying our neighbors testing the range of the remote; we completed the installation and set up the livestreaming equipment in time for it all to be tested Thursday evening!

Service and Justice

Life of companiment"

In 1982, a month after their wedding, Mark and Linda Jacobson moved to Kenya. Three years later they accepted a call with the Lutheran Church in America, a predecessor church of the ELCA, to serve as community health workers with the Arusha Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT). Little did they know that they would become the ELCA's longest-serving active mission personnel, with 38 years of service.

"Mark and Linda Jacobson are the embodiment of a faithful servant of Christ." said Rafael Malpica Padilla, ELCA executive director for Service and Justice. "Their whole life has been a life of accompaniment." Mission Support, which funds ELCA mission personnel, makes the Jacobsons' work possible.

In the beginning, Mark, a doctor, supported Maasai community health workers in six small primary-care clinics. He quickly concluded that "prevention could only prevent a certain amount of disease; people still needed a place to go when they were acutely ill." So, with the ELCT, he developed one of the clinics into Selian Lutheran Hospital, which now provides care in orthopedics, fistula, hospice and other areas.

Then he and his team opened the Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre, creating training programs for medical officers and nurses and opening a rehabilitation center for children recovering from surgery. Mark said he's proud of the work he and his colleagues have done together and loves seeing his colleagues' skillful leadership of the medical center since he stepped down from his leadership role there.

After working briefly in one of the clinics and then in hospital labs, Linda focused on coordinating volunteers, offering hospitality and arranging housing for visiting medical students and interns. But her most substantial accomplishment may be the support group Widow's Might, launched to counter Tanzania's practice of disinheriting widows. When a Tanzanian woman's husband dies, their property goes not to her but to her in-laws. Not every widow's in-laws claim the inheritance, but Evelyn (last name withheld) and her children stood to lose their house. "I'm not going to fight my family." Linda remembers her saying. "I'm just going to work. God will help me." Together, Evelyn and Linda launched Widow's Might, whose members support their families by weaving, sewing, embroidering and beading.

"I'm not going to fight my family, I'm just going to work, God will help me."

Remembering her life in Tanzania, Linda is most struck by her neighbors' faith. "If things get really bad [here], we pray," she said. "My neighbors start by asking us what God wants to do. ... [I] am learning from this tremendous faith."
