

We have gathered (in-person and by screen). We have heard. We have pondered. We have prayed for ourselves and a world when we both are:

- too disconnected,
- too ungrounded,
- too off the path.

And so, the One, the One who chose to come and to walk with us, talk with us, and share with us the humanity that we all share. That One made it happen, sharing a brokenness with us and yet not defeated; sharing pain with us, and yet not overcome; sharing death with us – even death on a cross - and yet not destroyed.

It is that One, who like a waiting, watching parent is always yearning to:

- embrace and enfold us,
- empower and extoll us,
- restore and renew us

to life again, and again, and again until that day when all there will be is life, and light, and love. Forever and ever, Amen.

It is that One, that precious One who has fully connected us back to where and to whom we fully belong. In this faith we continue in our journey - until that day when he will fold all things fully into the New Creation - as creatures of promise, ambassadors of love, and heirs of the Kingdom (Kin-dom) of God.

From ashes to empty tomb, our journey is embraced by love.

Why do we sing? As we return to singing in church without masks on, I thought it would be nice to revisit why we sing in worship.

Lutherans have always been known for their music. Throughout a service, scripture and words of praise are sung in hymns, liturgical songs, psalms, and anthems. There are often times when one (myself included...) can get caught up in the beauty of the music. A few years ago, I was at a conference of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians in Houston. At this conference there were multiple speakers addressing the need to focus on the text of a song. Music is merely a way to convey the text. Everything must enhance it and make it more meaningful.

In the Lutheran Church, the parishioners do not just sit back and listen to a service. They are directly involved in the singing of the hymns and liturgy. Instead of simply listening to the music, using it as a means of mediation and prayer, we can connect on a deeper level with God. By actually saying the words, themselves the text of a song becomes much more personal and often deepens our faith.

We also teach our faith through music. Hymns like A Mighty Fortress Is Our God, Infant Holy Infant Lowly and I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light are often used in children's choirs to teach them the faith in which they are growing up. While they might not yet understand exactly what they are singing, if the importance of music in worship is instilled in them as a young child, they will begin to read the text more carefully and gain a greater understanding as they grow up. There is a misconception about youth being more interested in praise and worship songs then traditional hymnody. I have found that most youth enjoy "traditional" worship just as much as "contemporary" worship as long as the worship is sincere. If the music is not presented in a way that enhances worship, we get distracted and lose sight of why we are here.

There is a famous quote by Martin Luther, "...next to the word of God, music deserves the highest praise." A key portion of that statement is *next to*. Not above, not below, but next to. Music is not a lesser art than theology. It is a gift from God that allows us to praise God on a deeper level. Poor worship happens when the perfect balance of Word and music is not created. When the music overpowers the Word, we put ourselves before God and lose sight of why we are here. When the music is not performed well, it distracts from the Word and we become bored and do not pay attention to the text we are singing.

There is a beauty in the poetry of our hymns that we often overlook. There are fantastic poets such as Paul Gerhardt, Susan Palo Cherwein and Carl Schalk who beautifully put our faith into words that are worthy to praise our Lord. I encourage you to take an extra moment on Sunday mornings to read through the text of that morning's hymns and appreciate its beauty.

New Mask Guidance for HCLC



At the beginning of mask mandates, the Holy Cross Church Council voted to follow the guidance of the CDC and local health authorities. As circumstances have changed, the CDC has developed a new tool to help communities decide what prevention steps to take based on the latest data. Both Loudoun and Fairfax Counties have been determined to have **Low COVID-19 Community Levels**. Accordingly, Council approved relaxing our mask requirement, and masks are now optional at Holy Cross. We will continue to monitor the situation, and we hope it will not be necessary to return to stricter policies. We are truly thankful as we begin the Lenten season!

OUTREACH



Thanks to you, our consistently generous Holy Cross family, our Lenten Appeals are well underway. We have a two-prong approach this year – one local and one global ministry.

To provide *local support*, we will provide non-perishable items for the Lunch for the Soul Ministry. Holy Cross has opened our doors and our hearts to the "Lunch for the Soul" Ministry. "Lunch for the Soul" provides a hot meal, fellowship, and worship for our local day labor community. We are asking members to contribute non-perishable items to support these lunches. Please consider donating:

- Water cases
- Paper bags (to pack items they take with them)
- "To Go" containers that we can put small leftovers in from the lunch
- Large package of paper napkins
- Large package of paper plates
- Large package of sturdy paper/plastic bowls

- Single serve fruit cups
- Snack bars
- Protein bars
- Iced Tea (non-refrigerated)
- Lemonade (non-refrigerated)
- Drinking cups (both for hot and cold beverages)
- Kitchen cleanup wipes
- Paper towels

To provide *global support*, Holy Cross will provide financial support to Lutheran Disaster Response, a branch of the ELCA, which is providing necessities for refugees in eastern Europe.

On Feb. 24, Russian forces invaded Ukraine, launching land, sea, and air attacks. Russia has launched air strikes across the country, including on the capital of Kyiv and other major cities. Airports are now shut, and few railway lines are operational. Millions of civilians fleeing the violence are heading toward Ukraine's western districts and such neighboring countries as Poland, Moldova, Slovakia, Romania, and Hungary. Hundreds of civilians have been killed in the conflict so far, and damage to civilian infrastructure has left hundreds of thousands of people without water or electricity. Ukrainian men of military age (18-60) are forbidden to leave the country, so most of those fleeing the violence are women and children.

According to one report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, more than 1 million people are seeking refuge in neighboring countries including Hungary, Poland, Slovakia, and Moldova. There are major humanitarian concerns for both internally displaced people and refugees. Many of these Ukrainians fleeing their homes need shelter and such basic as food, water, and toiletries. Care for people also includes pastoral and psychological support to address the trauma they've endured.

Lutheran Disaster Response, a branch of the ELCA, is accompanying companion organizations in Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, and Slovakia, as well as such ecumenical partners as Lutheran World Federation and Church World Service, in their humanitarian responses to the crisis. These partners provide refugees with immediate support and supplies such as food, blankets, water, and hygiene kits. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton has joined other religious leaders from Europe and around the globe in issuing an <u>interfaith call for peace</u> in the region.

Please pray for those in Ukraine, Russia and neighboring countries that have been affected by the crisis in Ukraine. May God's healing presence give them peace and hope in their time of need. And if you can, *please give*. Your gifts designated for "Lenten Appeal" will be used entirely (100%) to provide support for people impacted by conflict in the region. Thank you, as always, for your extraordinary generosity in caring for our brothers and sisters across the globe. When a congregation's location can best be described as "on the road out of town, near the mall," that might be a reason people aren't filling the pews. In fact, in early 2020, Living Christ Lutheran Church, Flagstaff, Ariz., was facing a 65% decline in membership since 2013. Grants from the Grand Canyon Synod, funded by Mission Support, helped sustain Living Christ's ministry.

So when the pandemic struck, the congregation faced an uncertain future.

After in-person worship was halted, Living Christ reignited its ministry by expanding its online footprint to include digital worship, with new sermon videos posted weekly and associated worship materials provided via PDF.

"We were initially just getting anywhere from 30 to 40 viewings for the sermons," said Dean Garner, council member and IT/website manager for Living Christ. "When I put a little more work towards it when the pandemic started, we got up to 70 to 100. Then we put just a few dollars into it [on Facebook], and now we're averaging 500 for the viewing of the sermons."

The online presence has enabled this church on the edge of town to reach an audience that extends from Phoenix to the Philippines.

"The internet has basically been as much of a change for the church as, say, Gutenberg and the printing press was for Luther," said Living Christ's pastor, Kurt Fangmeier. "We're always **trying to find new ways to be faithful, both to** the calling in our baptism but also in the midst of the world as it is."

Though Living Christ may be new to internet outreach, the congregation has long been known for involvement in its community, **particularly Flagstaff's LGBTQIA+ population.** In 2011, the congregation began sponsoring Pride in the Pines, an annual celebration **in Flagstaff that is hosted by the Northern** Arizona Pride Association (NAPA) and typically draws over 4,000 attendees.

"The internet has basically been as much of a change for the church as, say, Gutenberg and the printing press was for Luther."

"There are not too many churches ... that walk the walk and talk the talk," said Debra Taylor, president of NAPA, of the congregation's LGBTQIA+ outreach. "Living Christ does."

Now, in year two of the pandemic, Living Christ has transitioned to a hybrid in-person/ online model and plans to relocate to **downtown Flagstaff, which offers ample** outreach opportunities.

"The building has served us well for over 35 years and will serve us well again by providing us the means to take our mission elsewhere in our community," Garner said. "Jesus did not share the good news from one place, nor shall we.... We are excited about this new journey."
