

Faith is trust in a promise, The promise is a person, And the person is Jesus Christ.

My mentor in seminary, Rev. Dr. Duane Priebe, taught us those lines as an easy way to define what faith is. The lines build from the more abstract concept of faith to the specific, embodied relationship in Jesus Christ, which is important to remember as people of faith. "O Come"

Advent is a season of preparation and anticipation. A well-known hymn for the Advent season is *Oh, Come, Oh, Come, Emmanuel*. The full version contains seven stanzas, each one coming from one of the seven *O Antiphons*. The *O Antiphons* refer to the seven antiphons (an antiphon is a short verse sung in response to part of the liturgy) that are chanted at Vespers services during a special period of Advent preparation known as the Octave before Christmas. The Octave before Christmas is December 17-23, with December 24's Vespers service being the Christmas Vigil.

In their structure, each of the seven antiphons follows the same pattern, resembling a traditional liturgical prayer. Each O *antiphon* begins with an invocation of the expected Messiah, followed by praise of him under on of his particular titles. Each ends with a petition for God's people, relevant to the title by which he is addressed, and the cry for him to "Come."

The *O Antiphons* have been around since the early Christian Church, however their exact origin is not known. Boethius (c. 480-524) made a slight reference to them, thereby suggesting their presence at that time. By the eighth century the *O Antiphons* were in use in the liturgical celebrations of Rome. It was at this time that the *O*

Antiphons began to be referred to as *The Great O Antiphons*. These antiphons have been described as "a unique work of art and a special ornament of the pre-Christmas liturgy, filled with the spirit of the Word of God." They create a poetry that fills the liturgy with its splendor", and their composer shows "a magnificent command of the Bible's wealth of motifs."

The importance of *O Antiphons* is twofold. Each one highlights a title for the Messiah: *O Sepientia* (O Wisdom), *O Adonai* (O Lord), *O Radix Jesse* (O Root of Jesse), *O Clavis David* (O Key of David), *O Oriens* (O Rising Sun), *O Rex Gentium* (O King of Nations), and *O Emmanuel*. Also, each on refers to the prophecy of Isaiah of the coming of the Messiah.



O Wisdom, who came from the mouth of the Most High, reaching from end to end and ordering all things mightily and sweetly. Come, and teach us the way of prudence.

The "all-seeing eye" is used to represent the all-knowing and everpresent God. The three flames were later added to represent the Trinity. Wisdom begins the antiphons because it is considered the foundation of fear of the Lord, of holiness and of right living. Isaiah had prophesied, "The spirit of the LORD shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD. His delight shall be in the fear of the LORD. He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear;" (Isaiah 11:2-3), and "This also comes from the LORD of hosts; he is wonderful in counsel, and excellent in wisdom." (Isaiah 28:29)

O Lord and Ruler of the House of Israel, who appeared to Moses in the flame of the burning bush and gave him the law of Sinai. Come, and redeem us with outstretched arm.



The symbol for this antiphon is two tablets and a burning bush. These symbols remind us not only of God giving his law to the Israelites but also the Israelites' deliverance from bondage under pharaoh - a foreshadowing of our own redemption from sin. Isaiah 11:4-5 says, "but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth; he shall strike the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips he shall kill the wicked. Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins."



O Root of Jesse, who stands for an ensign of the people, before who kings shall keep silence and unto whom the Gentiles shall make supplication. Come to deliver us, and tarry not.

In this symbol the root of Jesse is shown with a flower growing out of it, another figure of Christ. Isaiah 11:1 & 10 prophesy the root of Jesse, "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots. On that day the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples; the nations shall inquire of him, and his dwelling shall be glorious."

O Key of David, and Scepter of the House of Israel, who opens and no man shuts, who shuts and no man opens. Come and deliver from the chains of prison those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death.



The symbol for this antiphon is a key because the key is an emblem of authority and power. Christ is the Key of the House of David who

opens to us the full meaning of the scriptural prophecies, and reopens for all mankind the gate of Heaven. Isaiah 22:22 says, "I will place on his shoulder the key of the house of David; he shall open, and no one shall shut; he shall shut, and no one shall open."



O Rising Sun, Radiance of the Light, eternal and Sun of Justice: come and enlighten those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death.

The title *Oriens* is translated into many phrases such as "Morning Star," "Dayspring," "Rising Sun," "Radiant Dawn," and "Orient." All beautifully expressing the idea of light shattering darkness and with its brightness bringing healing and warmth to cold hearts. Thus inspiring a rising sun as the symbol for this Antiphon. Isaiah prophesied the Rising Sun in Isaiah 9:1. "But there will be no gloom for those who were in anguish. In the former time he brought into contempt the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the latter time he will make glorious the way of the sea, the land beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the nations."

O King of all Nations and the desired of all, you are the cornerstone that brings two into one. Come, and save man whom you fashioned out of clay.



The crown is used as a symbol of this antiphon to signify Christ's universal kingship. As this Antiphon is recited it reminds us that Christ is not only the King of the Jewish nation, but the "Desired One of all," the cornerstone which unites both Jew and Gentile. Christ will come again to save everyone because we all belong to the creation that he made. Isaiah prophesied Christ's kingdom in Isaiah 9:7. "His authority shall grow continually, and there shall be endless peace for the throne of David and his kingdom. He will establish and uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time onward and forevermore. The zeal of the LORD of hosts will do this."



O Emmanuel, God with us, our King and Lawgiver, the expected of the nations and their Savior. Come to save us, O Lord our God.

The cross in a bed of hay reminds us of the simplicity and poverty surrounding the birth of Jesus and is representative of his life of humility. In Isaiah 7:14 it is prophesied, "Therefore the LORD himself will give you a sign. Look, the young woman is with child and shall bear a son, and shall name him Immanuel." With this last antiphon our expectation finds joy now in the certainty of fulfillment. We call Jesus by on of the most personal and intimate of his titles, Emmanuel, God-with-us.

The order of the *O Antiphons* is not happenstance. If one takes the first letter of each Latin antiphon (SARCORE) and places them in reverse order they reveal the words "Ero Cras" which translates to "Tomorrow I come." This acrostic is not completed until the final day of the Octave before Christmas, December 23. Thus, setting the stage for the Christmas Vigil on December 24. The day Christ descends upon the earth.





What a joyful time of year! The twinkling holiday lights, glorious Christmas carols, luscious smell of fresh baked cookies... I love Christmas time!

This is also a great time of year to consider how blessed we are, and to offer support and love to those less fortunate. This year we have both an Advent Appeal and an Epiphany collection.

For our **Advent Appeal**, we will restock the LINK food pantry with their most needed items. Each week we will collect one type of item.



This is the first activity as we enter our 60th year, and we aspire to deliver at least 60 items each week!

Please join us!

For **Epiphany**, we will collect items to make Personal Care Kits and Baby Kits for Lutheran World Relief to deliver wherever they are most needed around the globe. These kits provide very basic necessities for people in difficult and often dangerous situations. On Christmas Eve, you will receive an ornament with a list of items to collect during the 12 days of Christmas. If you want to get a head start, and shop some of the holiday bargains, here is the list of items we'll be collecting:

Personal Care Kits

- Light-weight bath size towel, dark colored preferred
- Bath size bars of soap, (2-3 per kit), in original packaging
- Adult size toothbrush in original packaging
- Sturdy comb
- Metal nail clipper



Baby Care Kits - sizes for babies 6-24 months

- Lightweight cotton t-shirts; No Onesies (2 per kit)
- Long or short sleeve gowns or sleepers without feet (2 per kit)
- Receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel (2 per kit)
- Cloth diapers, flat fold preferred (4 per kit)
- Jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood or include a baby hat
- Socks (2 pair per kit)
- Hand towel, dark color recommended
- Bath-sized bars of gentle soap in original packaging (2-3 per kit)

We ask that you bring those items with you to worship on Epiphany. We will assemble the kits on Monday, January 16th as part of the MLK Day of Service. All ages are welcome and encouraged to join us and help assemble the kits! We are again aspiring to assemble 60 kits to celebrate Holy Cross 60th anniversary. Finally, I'd like to thank everyone in the congregation for their joyful generosity this year. Whenever there is a need, you all step in and meet it. An Important IRS Reminder!

Donations made to Holy Cross Lutheran Church are deductible for 2022, as long as, they are made prior to January 1, 2023.

The last opportunity to make a donation in 2022, at a church



service, will be at the 9:30 am service on December 25th, Christmas Day. Donations can also be hand-delivered to the church office, by noon, Friday, December 30th, 2022. Mailed checks can count for 2022, as long as, they are postmarked in 2022. And lastly, a donation charged to a credit card in 2022 is counted for 2022 even if the charge is not paid until 2023.

STEWARDSHIP



We must keep the Church alive! If we aspire to keep Holy Cross Lutheran Church a thriving, serving community of God's people, we will each need to make a determined effort to ensure that our offerings sustain us. Your generosity makes all things possible.

Bring your offering with you to worship service at 8:30 or 11:00 am or to drive-thru communion on the 1st and 3rd Sundays at 12:30 pm.

There are three ways to give when you're not in the sanctuary:

- 1. To give online, simply go to our secure website and click "Donate" to set up an automatic donation plan.
- Download the free Vanco Mobile app. Once it's downloaded, you can use our Invite code, 24A7NT to ensure you are linked to the correct church, and login with your current Vanco credentials (whether from the GivePlus app or the our website's Donation page. If you do not have an account, you will be prompted to set one up.
- 3. You can also mail a check to the church (Holy Cross Lutheran Church, 1090 Sterling Road, Herndon, VA 20170) or bring a check to the drive-through communion on the 1st and 3rd Sundays at 12:30 PM. An even easier method of sending a single or recurring check donation to the church is by using Bill Pay with your bank or credit union online account or mobile app. Those payments are guaranteed and are shown in your bank or credit union records. Also, there is no fee to you and to the church.

Mask Guidance for HCLC



At the beginning of mask mandates, the Holy Cross Lutheran Church Council voted to follow the guidance of the CDC and local health authorities. Both Loudoun and Fairfax Counties have been determined to have **Low COVID-19 Community Levels** according to CDC guidelines. Accordingly, Council approved relaxing our mask requirement, and masks are now optional at Holy Cross. People may choose to mask at any time. People with symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19 should wear a mask. If you are immunocompromised, learn more about how to protect yourself.
