### **Director of Music and Liturgy**



We Three Kings is probably one of the best-known Epiphany carols. It is also one that is most often brought forward into the Christmas season for use at carol services. However, it is a straightforward dramatization of the story of the wise men's visit to Jesus after his birth on Christmas Day. This story is taken out of Matthew 2:7-11

<sup>7</sup>Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. <sup>8</sup>Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." <sup>9</sup>When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. <sup>10</sup>When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. <sup>11</sup>On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

The carol was first published in 1884 while its author, Rev. Dr. John Hopkins, was Rector of a parish in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. He wrote it as part of a Christmas pageant for a seminary in New York City. Hopkins is the composer of both the text and music for this hymn. It is interesting to note that Hopkins was very specific to note that there was to be no slowing down on the "O..." that starts each refrain, a request that has been clearly thrown out by modern culture. Hopkins has been criticized by Bible scholars that the first

people to visit Christ from Eastern lands were not kings; nor were there three of them. Yet so many people who learn this carol at a young age carry this misconception into adult life. The Bible simply calls these men "magi." It is believed that this term refers to a caste of Persian priests or sorcerers who were experts in astrology,

divination, and the interpretation of dreams. While they could have been rulers of a sort because of their offices, there is no reason to believe they had great wealth.

What we do know is that these Gentiles traveled some distance, intent upon worshiping the



newborn King of the Jews. With them they brought gifts of great worth - gold, frankincense and myrrh. Hopkins explains in his carol that these gifts were to prophesy what the Christ child would be. Gold prophesied his kingship. The frankincense spoke of his purity of life. Myrrh was a spice that embalmed the dead and predicted his coming death.

These gifts could also be interpreted as gifts that God desires from us still today. Gold to symbolize our most precious treasures, our hopes and dreams. Giving a gift of gold is giving from the heart. The frankincense denotes the pleasing fragrance that arises from a life of holiness and offering him our obedience. Myrrh is to proclaim the fact that we have died to self and now live in Christ, this giving him our very life.

Soli Deo Gloria!

### **Epiphany**

By the time you read this, the Christmas Season will be half over, and Epiphany will be fast approaching. Epiphany celebrates the visit by the Magi and the revelation of Jesus as the Son of God. In a secular context, an epiphany is a sudden insight or realization of the essential meaning of something. I've been reminded of the same "epiphany" over and over again (I'm a slow learner!): that "nudges" (which I keep ignoring) are often the Holy Spirit trying to guide me. I'm an analytical "Type A" person; I try to study situations, seek advice, weigh alternatives, and then proceed with the course of action that I've determined would be the best. This approach usually works well; however, I am not a patient person, and I find that (more often than I care to admit) what I thought would be the solution just doesn't work out because I've failed to let the Holy Spirit work on its own schedule and in its own way. It's not unusual for me to get a "nudge" in the fellowship of others, in some mundane activity, and it's only in retrospect that I realize that the Holy Spirit was active. I love soaring music in a beautiful cathedral and am usually inspired by the experience, but I've learned to also value the simple acts of kindness and joy I see all around me. A sacred experience can happen anywhere! It's just as likely to occur in the Fellowship Hall conversing with our brothers and sisters in Christ during Lunch for the Soul, or with fellow members during an Advent supper, or with acts of

kindness on the street, as it is in the church sanctuary or a beautiful cathedral, if our eyes and hearts are open. I've found that I'm not alone in this realization. Sarah Bessey, an associate of the late Rachel Held Evans, had a similar observation recently,

"These days, that knowing of God's love rarely happens in the places where I was told to look for God: church services, quiet times, Christian-lady-books, worship music, whatever. These days, I feel God's nearness most in the dark, in the public pool, around the dinner table, on unremarkable sidewalks, under a cover of stars. I feel God's love for all of us in sad songs and the creak of snow under your boots, in the lines of poetry and the long line-up of people snaking down the shopping mall aisles, all waiting to pick up a packet of information, so they can shop for a local family in need and drop off toys for kids they'll never meet."

I think the true "epiphany" that I've found is that we tend to treat church like the living room--we try to keep clean and orderly in case somebody drops by. We need to maintain an attitude of treating others like close friends and family, as we do in the "family room"--where we let our guard down and live our actual lives. I think the genuine welcoming and celebration of all is a key strength of Holy Cross, for it is only with our guards down, that we can be open to seeing the miracles God works in our daily lives and in the lives of those around us.



We are again aspiring to assemble 60 kits to celebrate Holy Cross 60th anniversary. ### **Personal Care Kits**

- Light-weight bath size towel, dark colored preferred
- Bath size bars of soap, (2-3 per kit), in original packaging
- Adult size toothbrush in original packaging
- Sturdy comb
- Metal nail clipper



### Baby Care Kits - sizes for babies 6-24 months

- Lightweight cotton t-shirts; No Onesies (2 per kit)
- Long or short sleeve gowns or sleepers without feet (2 per kit)
- Receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel (2 per kit)
- Cloth diapers, flat fold preferred (4 per kit)
- Jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood or include a baby hat
- Socks (2 pair per kit)
- Hand towel, dark color recommended
- Bath-sized bars of gentle soap in original packaging (2-3 per kit)

Bring your offering with you to worship service at 8:30 or 11:00 am or to drive-thru communion on the 1st and 3rd Sundays at 12:30 pm.

### There are three ways to give when you're not in the sanctuary:

- 1. To give online, simply go to our secure website and click "Donate" to set up an automatic donation plan.
- Download the free Vanco Mobile app. Once it's downloaded, you can use our Invite code, 24A7NT to ensure you are linked to the correct church, and login with your current Vanco credentials (whether from the GivePlus app or our website's Donation page. If you do not have an account, you will be prompted to set one up.
- 3. You can also mail a check to the church (Holy Cross Lutheran Church, 1090 Sterling Road, Herndon, VA 20170) or bring a check to the drive-through communion on the 1st and 3rd Sundays at 12:30 PM. An even easier method of sending a single or recurring check donation to the church is by using Bill Pay with your bank or credit union online account or mobile app. Those payments are guaranteed and are shown in your bank or credit union records. Also, there is no fee to you and to the church.

### Mask Guidance for HCLC



At the beginning of mask mandates, the Holy Cross Lutheran Church Council voted to follow the guidance of the CDC and local health authorities. Both Loudoun and Fairfax Counties have been determined to have **Low COVID-19 Community Levels** according to CDC guidelines. Accordingly, Council approved relaxing our mask requirement, and masks are now optional at Holy Cross. People may choose to mask at any time. People with symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19 should wear a mask. If you are immunocompromised, learn more about how to protect yourself.
