

## My Heart Shall Sing: A Call for Justice and Peace

# Music Sunday - 2023 June 11<sup>th</sup>, 8:30 AM and 11:00 AM

There are countless hymns and anthems that quote scripture calling for justice and peace to reign on earth. In the Canticle of the Turning, Rory Cooney's text quotes Mary's Magnificat and reminds us that God's justice will tear tyrants from their throne. Bernadette Farrell wrote both text and tune for Christ, Be Our Light, a hymn whose stanzas portray a dark world longing for justice and peace while its refrain calls for God's people to be the light of Christ for those in need. Mary Louise Bringle's text in Light Dawns on a Weary World has quickly become a favorite at Holy Cross. Bringle's hymn text holds up the fact that God's creation cannot flourish until the most vulnerable among us are cared for. Her refrain quotes Isaiah 55 as we sing about trees clapping their hands when justice and peace exist for everyone. Let Streams of Living Justice pairs a text from William Whitla quoting Amos 5:24 (But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.) with Gustav Holst's majestic THAXTED tune.

Join us on June 11<sup>th</sup> for a celebration of our music program as we explore how composers interpret the call for God's people to care for each other.

My heart shall sing of the day you bring.

Let the fires of your justice burn

Wipe away all tears, for the dawn draws near,
and the world is about to turn.

Holy Cross Family -

#### Love One Another

Perhaps the biggest factor in our decision to join Holy Cross was the pervasive welcoming attitude of so many of its members. We were a little "gun-shy" about getting involved because we had been hurt and discouraged by some of our experiences, and we took a rather cautious approach for fear of being hurt again. As we became more involved, we found that the people of Holy Cross did a pretty good job of "being the church!" We've repeatedly seen that in the way members respond to the needs of the community.

Sometimes we forget that those closest to us often put on a brave face even as they confront difficulties in their lives. We only hear



about a few situations, usually because some dramatic event forces awareness. At our recent Council Retreat (we "retreated" to the Fellowship Hall!) your leaders explored ideas of how we might better follow Christ's great commandment to Love One Another. The idea of starting a Stephen Ministry was suggested. For those who may not be

familiar with this ministry, it's been around since the 1970's and offers a proven and effective way to organize, equip, and

supervise a team of congregation members—called *Stephen Ministers*—to provide high-quality, one-to-one, Christ-centered care to people in the congregation and the community experiencing life difficulties. This formal program requires a dedicated coordinator and funding for training and materials. Since it was not in the 2023 budget, the Council decided to task someone to explore it and gather information on financial commitments for our 2024 budget planning.

Sarah Schulmeyer accepted responsibility to do the research and reported back this week. It turns out the financial commitment is ~\$4,000, so that amount is what we thought we'd need to ask the Finance Committee to consider for the 2024 Budget. Sarah offered to serve as the coordinator and to begin educating the Committee and members of the Congregation on the program. However, this week a donor (who wishes to remain anonymous) spoke highly of the ministry based on personal experience and offered to match all donations up to \$4,000 to accelerate the implementation of the Stephen Ministry. Therefore, we decided to extend that offer to the Congregation.

#### The May Joke of the Month!


A visitor got lost looking for the May Day Fair in a rural part of the state and asked a local resident, "Will this road take me to the May Day Fair?"

Bring your stash of coins to welcome them with noise!




# Holy Cross Recognized as a National Wildlife Federation "Certified Wildlife Habitat"

At this year's retreat, the Church Council discussed how we take care of God's creation. We recognized that our amazing property provides not only a wonderful house of worship, but also a sanctuary for local wildlife. The Council voted to pursue seeking National Wildlife Federation (NWF) Wildlife Habitat Certification for our property as an opportunity to remind us to take care of God's creation.

#### What does it take to be an NWF Certified Wildlife Habitat?

#### There are 5 key requirements:

- Food Native plants provide food for eaten by a variety of wildlife.
- Water All animals need water to survive, and some need it for bathing or breeding.
- **Cover** Wildlife need places to take shelter from bad weather and places to hide from predators.
- Places to Raise Young Wildlife need resources to reproduce, and to protect and nourish their young.
- Sustainable Practices Maintain the property in natural ways to ensure soil, air, and water stay healthy and clean, avoiding pesticides, herbicides and other harmful chemicals. Use mulch to help reduce water usage.

are delighted to share that Holy
Cross met these requirements and
is officially an
NWF Certified Wildlife Habitat!!

We are excited about this, and hope to build on where we are, including:

- exploring adding more pollinator plants to attracts, bees, birds and butterflies:
- 2. working with Scouts to add some shelters for wildlife;
- 3. explore building roosting boxes;
- 4. continue to focus on sustainable practices, including an addition of a compost bin.

# Wildlife who've found their home on our church property!





We are finishing our spring semester on May 10<sup>th</sup> at Holy Cross. We have had a successful spring semester with almost 50 student registrations from 9 different countries: El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, India, Nicaragua, Peru, Togo, Vietnam and Ukraine. We get one or two new students almost every week! Students also stop coming to class due to longer work hours or for family reasons.

We start our summer semester on June 14<sup>th</sup> and it runs until July 26<sup>th</sup> on Wednesdays from 7:00-8:30 pm. Our summer semester is free of charge! Students in our Basic and Intermediate classes work with two books, one student book and a matching workbook. Our Beginner students use one picture book to study English. Teachers also create separate lessons to enhance their book learning.

A big Thank YOU to Suzanne Baggett, Jeanne Maysonett, Alejandra Caceres and Chip Edwards. Thank you for your dedication and patience teaching our immigrants at Holy Cross.

We aspire to keep Holy Cross Lutheran Church a thriving, serving community of God's people. We each need to make a determined effort to ensure that our offerings sustain us. Your generosity makes all things possible.

#### There are three ways to give when you're not in the sanctuary:

- 1. To give online, simply go to our secure website and click "Donate" to set up an automatic donation plan.
- 2. Download the free **Vanco Mobile** app. Once it's downloaded, you can use our Invite code, **24A7NT** to ensure you are linked to the correct church, and login with your current Vanco credentials (whether from the GivePlus app or our website's Donation page. If you do not have an account, you will be prompted to set one up. An even easier method of sending a single or recurring check donation to the church is by using Bill Pay with your bank or credit union online account or mobile app. Those payments are guaranteed and are shown in your bank or credit union records. Also, there is no fee to you or to the church.
