Grace, Gratitude and Generosity

²³ 'For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. ²⁴When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him;²⁵ and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made.²⁶ So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything." ²⁷And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. ²⁸But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow-slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, "Pay what you owe." ²⁹Then his fellow-slave fell down and pleaded with him, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you." ³⁰But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he should pay the debt. ³¹When his fellow-slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. ³²Then his lord summoned him and said to him, "You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. ³³Should you not have had mercy on your fellow-slave, as I had mercy on you?" ³⁴And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he should pay his entire debt.³⁵ So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.'

Matthew 18:21-35

In this passage, Jesus tells a story that has come to be known as the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant. In the story, a Ruler forgives one servant the modern equivalent of roughly \$10,000,000. The newly

liberated servant, however, in turn throws a fellow servant in jail for the personal debt a few thousand dollars. The real tragedy of this story is that the first servant never understood the grace that was already his, but is still trapped in the system of profit and loss, earning and losing.

This month, we will hear a lot about stewardship and we will invite us all to make a pledge to financially support the mission and the ministry of Holy Cross. The word stewardship can churn up a lot of anxious feelings in many of us--feelings of duty, obligation, and even guilt. Perhaps we have been told in the past that it's time for each of us to "do our part" and give back to God. However, the problem with that line of so-called motivation is that it never gets past the same trap the poor servant was in. It's all about what we owe, and not about what we have already been given.

Stewardship is taking care of what is already God's. Grace is about God's gifts to us. All that we are, all that we have, all the acceptance and love--that belongs to God and we are asked to care for it.

Gratitude is a response to this liberation. We don't own it, we didn't create it, we can't earn it, so we lift up our hands and give thanks.



Generosity is living out this gracious gratitude—in sharing, and service with, and for others. Imagine if the first servant, fresh from the throne room of grace, had come to his fellow servant and said, "Can you believe it? Our master just forgave me a debt that would have taken 1,000 life times to pay back! Oh, and those few bucks you owe me? Forget about it!" That's the sort of liberation Jesus holds up as part of God's Kingdom. Grace leads to gratitude that leads to generosity.

God's abundance frees us and calls us to a new life where we can share, not motivated by guilt or duty, but with joy. This isn't just an October thing, but a new life in Jesus that loves and leads us each day.

During the month of October HCLC will be focusing on stewardship. Church leaders are working on the 2024 budget, church members are being asked to fill out pledge cards, there will be temple talks in worship on the subject; many aspects of church life will be focused on stewardship. I thought it would be appropriate to write about a stewardship hymn for this month's Quest. The words of Fred Pratt Green's hymn text, *For the Fruit of All Creation*, serve as a wonderful focus to why and how we are called to be stewards of creation.

Green's concern for justice and spreading a social gospel is almost always evident in his hymns. These themes are especially prominent in *For the Fruit of All Creation*. Green's hymn text combines our gratitude to God for the bounties of the earth with our responsibility to care for our neighbor through "the harvests we are sharing." Our gratitude to God is found in stanzas one and three with "thanks be to God" repeated after every phrase. Our responsibility to care for our neighbor can be found in stanza two with "God's will is done" repeated after every phrase. Green's use of repeating responses with these phrases certainly drives home the aspects of stewardship that we should be focusing on--we should give thanks to God for everything we have because it all came from God, and we should share these gifts with those in need because that is what God calls us to do.

This hymn text also emphasizes our responsibility to care for everyone, not just those we like or those closest to us. Stanza one cites God's "good gifts to every nation." Stanza two mentions "our worldwide task of caring for the hungry and despairing." Stanza three acknowledges "the good we all inherit."

Green uses the trinity to shape the stewardship theme in this harvest hymn. Stanza one clearly references the God of harvest. Stanza two alludes to Christ's earthly ministry of loving thy neighbor. Stanza three references the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the mystery that surrounds its presence. I particularly love the poetry that ends Stanza three, "For the

wonders that astound us, for the truths that still confound us, most of all, that love has found us, thanks be to God.” Rhyming each phrase with “astound/confound/found” and “us” builds tension as we sing about the Spirit’s mysterious power.

I hope you take a moment and read Green’s hymn text as you pray over how you can best support Holy Cross financially. The ministries of HCLC are a prime example of how Green portrays a Christ-like stewardship in *For the Fruit of All Creation*. Offerings from all who worship in our church home are how we are able to live out this calling.

Do We Take it for Granted That Holy Cross Will Always Be Here?

Holy Cross Family –

This is not a pleasant article to write as I like for these missives to be generally upbeat. A little background for that statement is in order. Ordinarily we would have presented the first draft of our budget for the new year at the September Council Meeting. However, several extraordinary property-related expenditures have combined with a persistent slump in contributions to place us in a challenging financial position this year. We have not seen the usual recovery from the summer, and the Finance Team felt that we needed another month's worth of data to determine the full significance of the financial challenges facing us.

First of all, we are current on all financial obligations, and we are in the process of obtaining bids for the restroom project (for which we feel we have sufficient designated capital funds). However, we cannot ignore the revenue and cost mismatches on the operational side.

Our facilities and professional staff enable us to serve as a kind of spiritual filling station. Holy Cross is a place where community outreach can be based, where we can have fellowship, be sustained by comfort within a caring partnership, and continue to develop our

faith. Our two largest areas of ongoing operational expenses are the maintenance of our facilities and the costs of personnel.

We have been blessed with skilled and dedicated volunteers who have kept the costs down by performing maintenance activities far beyond what would normally be expected.

Church leadership exercises prudent financial management and maintains

budgetary oversight. The problem is that contributions have not kept up with expenses. Over the last few years, several members who were large contributors have either moved away or are otherwise no longer with us. A number of people got out of the habit of attending during the pandemic and have not returned. For those who remain, many are on fixed incomes and not in a position to increase their contributions. Others appear to be giving the same round number they've been giving for years. Whatever the reasons, the reality is that we are seeing a persistent trend of operating income falling behind our operational costs. We are hopeful giving will pick up as folks get back into 'the swing of things' this fall, but I felt that we needed to share with you the reality of our situation.



During October, we will be emphasizing stewardship and will have Pledge Sunday on Reformation Sunday, October 29, 2023. In the meanwhile, if you are in a position to make a one-time gift of any amount to help address the shortfall, we all could really use it!

Thank you ALL for the countless thing you do to make Holy Cross a special, welcoming, and sustaining community of the faithful!

A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER



Endowment Contributions

One may not see how modest donations can make a significant difference, but they can. I would like to share an example with you of how that has been accomplished here at Holy Cross. The Gouldman Fund started in 1977 with a bequest of \$1,000 from Mr. Henry Gouldman and a donation of \$300 from his widow, Mrs. May Gouldman. In the ensuing years, she and others made additional contributions. By the time of her death in 1990, the value had risen to \$31,000. At the time of the writing of this note for the Quest, the Fund has a value of \$47,500. That number is only part of the story. This has not been an idle investment fund, but has been drawn on repeatedly in support of initiatives and projects to fulfill the mission of Holy Cross, including sending our young people to the ELCA Youth Gathering for several years. Last year \$5,000 from the Fund was used toward upgrading the lighting systems outside and inside the Church. The Gouldman Fund has been in existence for forty-six years and will be around for many more in the future. If you are looking for a way to make a lasting impact, please consider the model of the Gouldman Fund.

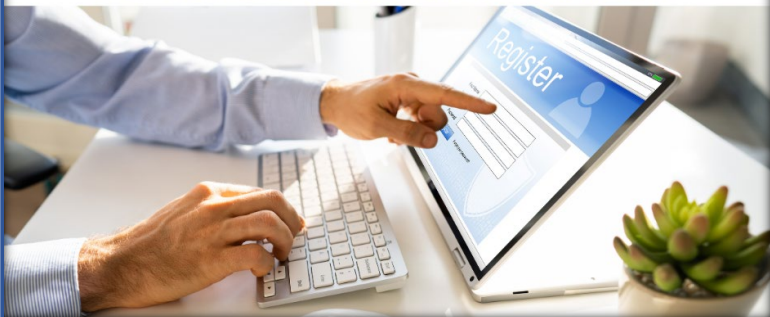

RALLY DAY RECAP!

The Stephen Ministry was represented at a table during Rally Day and I spoke with many from our congregation who were excited to learn about the Stephen Ministry implementation.

Here are a few things **YOU** may want to know:

- **Stephen Ministers** meet one-on-one with a congregational member who has care concerns. They only meet with one person, one hour per week, over a period of time.
- **Stephen Ministers** receive 20 hours of biblical/scriptural training with monthly Continuing Education.
- A “care receiver” might include someone who is ill, terminally ill, going through a divorce, lonely, depressed, experiencing the death of a loved one, loss of job/home, etc.
- The Stephen Ministry supports **Holy Cross’s Mission Statement** of **“We are a united family dedicated to reaching out and providing opportunity through worship, witness, education and service.”**
- The name “Stephen Ministry” is derived from Acts 6 when the disciples were overwhelmed with the needs of the new church of believers and commissioned “Apostles” to care for their needs in order to continue their focus on spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ. The first Apostle commissioned was Stephen.

This Stephen Ministry “Caregivers Compass” expresses some of the essentials for “Christ caring for people through people”, with Christ at the center.

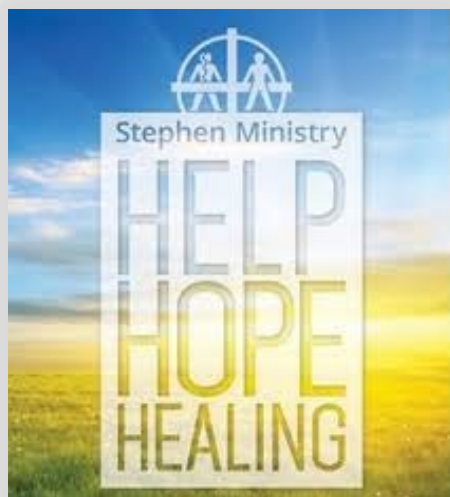
We now have 4 people who have made a commitment to become Stephen Ministers. We hope for their training to begin in early 2024.

There are three ways to give when you're not in the sanctuary:

2. Download the free **Vanco Mobile** app. Once it's downloaded, you can use our Invite code, **24A7NT** to ensure you are linked to the correct church, and login with your current Vanco credentials (whether from the GivePlus app or our website's Donation page. If you do not have an account, you will be prompted to set one up. An even easier method of sending a single or recurring check donation to the church is by using Bill Pay with your bank or credit union online account or mobile app. Those payments are guaranteed and are shown in your bank or credit union records. Also, there is no fee to you or to the church.
