Being Grateful

Some years ago, I was invited to give a talk at a Senior Center on the topic of an "Attitude of Gratitude." Gratitude, that ability to be thankful, is certainly an important and healing component of who we are as God's people, but it can also be a difficult thing to conjure up if we are overwhelmed by other things in our lives.

What we have come to know as "the holiday season" — roughly Thanksgiving to New Year's Day-- can be a tough time for many people. It's a time where we often hear a lot about being grateful, or thankful, or joyous. But it's also a time when many of us may find it hard to really feel that way. In the northern latitudes, this time of year gets dark. It gets colder. Even in Virginia, we know and feel this all too well. Our bodies naturally react to the decreased light and heat by slowing down — literally depressing. We feel sluggish. We may feel sad. Being joyful or thankful does not seem like the natural thing we want to do right now. This time of year can also be very difficult for those who have experienced loss in their lives. The memories of family members who have passed, or of a family that once was whole, or of people who are far away, can all make this an emotionally dark time for us as well.

When you yourself are struggling with grief or depression or just feeling a bit overwhelmed by it all, it can be particularly hard when there is almost a *demand* in our society that you be upbeat and joyous. The reality is that a lot more of us are hurting than we think,

or dare to let on. While the society around us may *seem* to be happy, joyous, and full of gratitude, it is also a fact that reports of depression, feelings of loneliness, domestic violence, and even suicide all peak in the months of November, December and January. The holiday months can be tough.



So how can we can we remain grateful even in the midst of the darkness that may surround us? I suggest starting by taking stock of the gifts we have received and the people that are and have been in our lives. When people first come into a 12-step recovery program, they are often at the lowest point in their lives. One of the very first practices they are taught is to begin to write down, each day, something for which they are grateful. It seems counterintuitive to ask people who "have hit their bottom" to be grateful, but each day is a baby-step to healing.

We can also remember to allow ourselves to feel how we feel, and to remember that others we meet may also be going through a tough time. There is no need for guilt or shame. Our pain, our grief, our brokenness are real parts of who we are. But they are also not fully who we are, or what we may become. As people of faith, we also trust that the Light is greater than the darkness, and our dark places are not the only definition of who we are. In the dark, love remains.

At that Senior Center, I offered up a working definition of what an "Attitude of Gratitude" might look like:

It is not the denial of the suffering, pain, and loss we have experienced,

but the personal decision to look through these events into a larger realization of:

what we have been given,
what we have been allowed to achieve, and
the people we have loved and who have loved us,
all of which has made us who we are today.

While by no means complete, I pray that this humble attempt may help us in a new way in which we can give thanks. May we be gentle with ourselves and with one another. May we be sensitive to the complexities that this time of year may bring to us and to others. And may we be truly grateful for all that we have received, even if it is one thing this day.

God's blessings and love to us.

Now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and **VOICES**.

Every year at Thanksgiving most families sit down to dinner and start one by one stating something they are thankful for. During November the family of Holy Cross Lutheran Church will spend time giving thanks to God and certainly singing, "Now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and voices!"

Today, I'd like to take time and focus on the "voices" part of that phrase. As Director of Music and Liturgy, it makes sense that I would want to write about how we use our voices to give thanks and praise to God. However, there is so much more to giving thanks and praise to God with our voices than simply singing. We are Lutherans. We have (in my humble opinion) the best hymnody out there. We are known for our confident four-part singing of bold Lutheran chorales. We have the singing part of using our voices down. We must also give thanks to God with our voices by evangelizing!

Many of you remember Pastor Johnson's time at Holy Cross. In her first sermon she mentioned the typical Lutheran method of evangelism. Simply standing in a boat and shouting, "Here fishy, fishy!" Many of us are afraid of evangelism because we think that means beating someone over the head with your religious beliefs until they believe what you believe. It is understandable. That model of evangelism is seen in use all too often.

But at the heart of the word evangelism is the word *evangelion*. The Greek word for gospel, or "good news." As evangelists we need to go out and share the good news. We need to tell others what God has done for us. We don't need to worry about how many

people we convert, but how often we share with others the things we are grateful for.

Everyone has days when they are depressed and feel like nothing could possibly go their way. God never promised us a perfect life. God promised us God's self! Even in times of trouble we can always rest assured in the fact that we have God to lean on. That is certainly something we can give thanks to God for!

In addition to belting out all three stanzas of *Now Thank We All Our God* this November we also need to remember to use our voices as Christians in the community. Remember that you always have something to be thankful for and reminding someone else of that will more than likely cause them to think of more things they can give thanks and praise to God for.

Now Thank We All Our God

"Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." 1 Thessalonians 5:18

Martin Rinkart, a Lutheran minister, was in Eilenburg, Saxony, during the Thirty Years' War. This walled city became home to many refugees due to the war. After the Swedish army surrounded the city, famine and plague began to run rampant. Hundreds of homes were destroyed, and people began to perish. Pastors, who were already stretched to their limits, performed dozens of funerals a day. Not too long into the tragedy, Rinkart was the only minister left in Eilenburg performing more than fifty funerals a day (including his own wife). When the Swedes demanded a huge ransom, Rinkart lifted the safety of the walls and pled for mercy. The Swedish commander was impressed by his faith and courage and lowered his demands. Soon after this event the Thirty Years' War ended, Rinkart wrote the hymn Now Thank We All Our God for a grand celebration service. Rinkart was able to use his faith to lead him beyond his feelings of depression. He would often go to the Bible to find reasons to trust in God's presence. It is a testament to his faith that, after such misery, he was able to write a hymn of abiding trust and gratitude toward God.

Now thank we all our God, with heart and hands and voices, Who wondrous things has done, in Whom this world rejoices; Who from our mothers' arms has blessed us on our way With countless gifts of love, and still is ours today.

O may this bounteous God through all our life be near us, With ever joyful hearts and blessed peace to cheer us; And keep us in His grace, and guide us when perplexed; And free us from all ills, in this world and the next!

All praise and thanks to God the Father now be given; The Son and Him Who reigns with Them in highest Heaven; The one eternal God, whom earth and Heaven adore; For thus it was, is now, and shall be evermore.



We have a very successful 2023 ELL program at Holy Cross. We are blessed with many students from several different countries.

For our 2023 Spring, Summer and Fall semester we have a total of 113 students from 13 countries! It's interesting how our student population changes with each semester.

<u>Spring Semester:</u>

We taught 51 students from 11 countries. Most students in that semester were from El Salvador, Honduras and Peru.

Summer Semester:

We taught 21 students from 7 countries. Most students attending originally came from El Salvador and Peru.

Current Fall Semester:

We are teaching a total of 41 students right now who come from 8 countries. Most of our students come from Peru.

Overall, our students during this year come from 13 countries: Columbia, El Salvador, Egypt, Honduras, Guatemala, India, Iran, Mexico, Nicaragua, Peru, Togo, Ukraine and Vietnam. We accept students any time and usually have one or more students start classes with us during a semester.

We are very grateful for Luisa Perez Birson, our ELL nursery attendant, who also helps us register students and translates for us.

The Stephen Ministry was presented to our congregation during both the 8:30 and 11:00 am services on Sunday, September 24th. God produced several answers to prayer which included:

- The disclosure by our Supply Pastor, Mark Cole, that he is a Stephen Minister, stating "it is one of the most satisfying ministry's he has been involved in, with a high standard of training."
- Initiated many positive questions of interest from people in our congregation.
- Supplied us with one additional Stephen Minister to join us when
 we begin the training in January! There are now six
 congregational members who have made the decision to bring
 Christ's love and care to people during a time of need by
 becoming Stephen Ministers.
- Initiated discussion from members of *their* need for a Stephen Minister.

Stephen Ministry Training:

Training for Stephen Ministers will begin in January 2024 and cover 25 modules which will include stimulating topics about:

- The Art of Listening
- Ministering to Those Experiencing Grief
- Distinctively Christian Caring
- Using Mental Health Professionals and Other Community Resources
- Maintaining Boundaries in Caregiving
- Crisis Theory and Practice

How to Become Involved:

- Invest Financially The Stephen Ministry has been able to move forward with implementation due to a generous monetary gift prior to being included in the 2024 budget with the inclusion that matching funds be raised. The initial investment has been \$3537, which does not include the cost of training materials for each Stephen Minister moving forward. - Invest Time Becoming a Stephen Minister is a meaningful investment in yourself and others. Training will begin in January 2024.

Download the free Vanco Mobile app. Once it's downloaded, you can use our Invite code, 24A7NT to ensure you are linked to the correct church, and login with your current Vanco credentials (whether from the GivePlus app or our website's Donation page. If you do not have an account, you will be prompted to set one up. An even easier method of sending a single or recurring check donation to the church is by using Bill Pay with your bank or credit union online account or mobile app. Those payments are guaranteed and are shown in your bank or credit union records. Also, there is no fee to you or to the church.
